Halton Fastball

The indications are that the Halton County Men's Fastball League will be operating on a five-team format this year. The four winners in the first round then meet the top four teams in a regular tournament format.

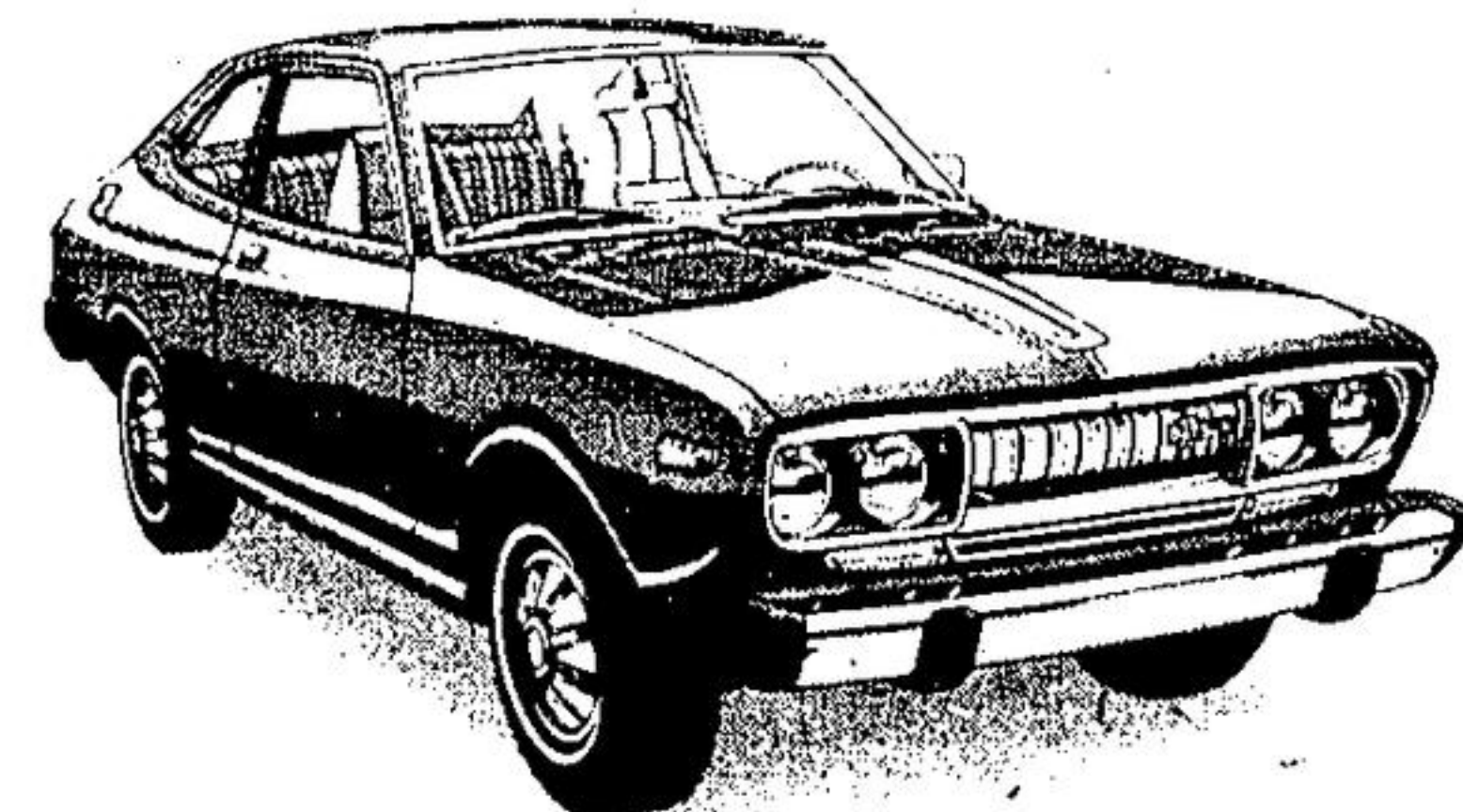
