## Coroner's jury recommends policy on high speed chases

The three-man two-woman coroner's jury, which described itself as "representative of the citizens of Halton Hills" in the inquest into the events surrounding the death of Eric James Couture, 18, and six other youths March 24 on Hwy 25 south of Acton produced the following recommendations:

"1. The Halton Regional Police should establish a policy with regards to high speed pursuits, upon receiving the policies of other recognized police agencies such as OPP, RCMP, QPP, and conferring with senior officials in those agencies.

"2. A point should be made to formally convey such a policy to the Halton Regional Police officers.

"3. A Sargent or senior officer should be available to take control of the dispatch desk upon a moment's notice in the event of all emergencies or priority situations.

"4. Research available communication systems to obtain a system for Halton Region which could eliminate or minimize problems such as dead communication zones, static interference, and incorporate an emergency override feature as well as back-up facilities for crucial system components.

"5. Leaving ignition keys in an unattended vehicle should be made an offence under provincial statutes and publicized as being so."

The jury also said: "We formally commend Const. Roduck for his very professional conduct concerning all phases of his duties as a Halton Regional Police officer on the evening of March 6, 1976."

"We feel that the Halton Regional Police and this community is exceedingly fortunate to have an officer of his integrity and capabilities."

"We as the representatives of the citizens of Halton Hills unanimously hope that this unfortunate incident would not deter him from acting in a similar manner on our behalf in the future."

A jury in a coroner's inquest does not determine guilt or innocence or deliver a verdict. As laid down in the Coroner's Act, its duties are to determine who died, how the deceased died, where and when death occurred and by what means the deceased came to death. Coroner's juries may make recommendations on any matters arising out of the inquest.
