allocated for her own uses. The couple argued, however, over the \$10,000 which Mrs. Baron demanded to pay for their son's bank loan. Mrs. Baron said that her husband had objected to the loan.

"He said, 'Get the hell out of here and put the loan yourself!'" Mrs. Baron recalled. "He always threatened me that he was the boss and that I was just the housekeeper."

Mrs. Baron said that her husband had initially objected to sale of the farm, telling her "You came here with nothing, you'll go with nothing."

Subsequent purchase offers for the farm, she said, ranged from \$160,000 to \$180,000 though the farm has not been sold.

According to the testimonies of Mrs. Baron and Gunter Mayer, Horst Baron was outside the house loading a truck when they arrived home Oct. 27 within ten minutes of one another about 7 p.m.

They stated that Mrs. Baron had prepared supper and had sat down with Mr. Mayer and Wayne to eat while Mr. Baron was still outside.

Mrs. Baron said that her husband had entered the kitchen and reached over to a wall shelf above the stove. She said he may have been holding something in his fist when he struck her several times on the head and knocked her to the floor.

Mr. Mayer testified that he rose from his seat at the kitchen table and cried out when he saw Mr. Baron draw the revolver from his pocket. He stated that he dove to the floor when Mr. Baron aimed the gun at him, but was shot once in the chest.

Mrs. Baron said that her husband then shot her three times, in the chest, the stomach and the arm.

"I saw someone running out and I looked around for the child but I couldn't see him," she said. "I crawled outside and somebody yanked me up on the highway."

Mr. Baron was taken to the Acton Medical Centre by a passer-by, and then transferred to a Guelph Hospital. Despite her two-week stay in hospital, she said, she had still not fully recovered from the wounds, noting the stitches she had received on her scalp, where she said Mr. Baron had struck her.

Mr. Mayer, an employee of the Etobicoke Board of Education, who now lives with his son in Mimico, recalled hearing three shots after he himself was wounded. He said that he picked up a kitchen chair and threw it at Mr. Baron, striking him in the right forearm.

Mr. Baron, then walked over to the rear of a wood stove and took aim at something hidden behind the stove, Mr. Mayer said.

"He had a mad, angry look on his face," he testified. "I couldn't see Wayne so I

assumed he was behind the stove."

Mr. Mayer stated that he heard one shot, followed by silence, and assumed that his son had been killed. He then ran from the kitchen to a neighbouring house for assistance.

Wayne Mayer told the court that he was shot while crouching behind the wood stove. The bullet, he explained, entered his left chest and passed through his body. He said that he then heard Mr. Baron telephone the police as he walked out of the kitchen to his father's car. Moments later, Halton Regional Police transported Wayne to Georgetown Memorial Hospital.

Both Mr. Mayer and Wayne stated that they had recovered fully from their wounds after two weeks in hospital.

The Mayers moved into the Baron's farmhouse in November, 1973, after Mr. Mayer was separated from his wife. Mr. Mayer had first met

Mr. Baron when the two men emigrated together from Germany in 1953. Mrs. Baron joined her husband three months after his arrival in Canada. The Barons moved to Acton from Mimico in 1968.

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756 Rifle team wins trophy

impressed by the weight of the argument presented by the ICG," Mr. Maloney wrote. "The ICG are a very representative group of citizens and their sincerity, dedication and absence of self-interest are beyond question."

Nevertheless, he noted, the office of the ombudsman is precluded from investigating the group's complaint by the Section 14 (B) of the Ombudsman Act of 1975. He further yielded to the "strong opposition" voiced by Mr. Rowan to any recommendations he might consider making on the citizens' behalf, as requested by the ICG.

"I have reluctantly come to the conclusion that since the matter is totally outside my jurisdiction, it would be inappropriate for me to accede to this request," Mr. Maloney said.

MALONEY IMPRESSED

In a letter to Mr. Mann, Mr. Maloney said he was "very impressed by the ICG representatives who had met with him several times since

he was first contacted last July.

Mr. Maloney agreed to investigate the matter in December, but was informed almost immediately by Mr. Timbrell that his jurisdiction was "called into question."

Subsequent information revealed that on May 29, 1974, the cabinet accepted the recommendation of the Solandt Commission regarding the Limehouse crossing. The cabinet later gave its approval in principle to the Bradley to Limehouse corridor, which, it was decided, would utilize "the route of an existing Hydro right of way which already has general acceptance by most citizens groups."

In his letter to Mr. Timbrell, Mr. Maloney noted that Ontario Hydro "has already held hearings of necessity in the Bruce to Owen Sound Region and will be expediting land for 230 Kv line in this territory."

"In addition," Mr. Maloney said, "it appears that Ontario Hydro has intentions of con-

structing a line from Collingwood to Essa. In light of the above, it seemed reasonable to the ICG to suggest that at some future date, Ontario Hydro would consider the erection of a transmission line from Owen Sound to Collingwood in order to "complete the system."

Perhaps at this stage of development of the northern line, consideration could be given to a 500 Kv corridor in lieu of a 230 Kv corridor."

ACCUSED CABINET

Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed last week accused cabinet members of making a "sham" out of last summer's environmental hearing board meetings on the corridor issue.

Despite Treasurer Darcy McKeough's statements in the house in November, 1974, that "no route could be adequately justified unless the whole area was studied...in addition to undertaking public participation," the government has never ordered "a proper study of the whole line," Mr. Reed said.

Mr. Reed rebutted comments made last month by Mr. Timbrell that he had remained "strangely silent" on the corridor issue.

"I suggest he study the transcripts of the Hydro select committee, in which the subject was raised by me five times at least," Mr. Reed said.

The subject was also broached, he said in his speech to the throne last January.

The ICG represents some 4,500 residents in Halton Hills, Erin, East Garafraxe, East Luther, West Luther, Proton, Egremont, Normanby, Ben-tenck and Brant Townships, as well as Halton Region and

Grey, Wellington and Dufferin Counties.

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
