The season, as I have mentioned before, is open there. The Trout are even being seeen jumping the dam at Alliston. That is a good place for the family to see the wonders of these fish as they try to get upriver to spawn. They are trapped in a holding area by the ministry of natural resources, tagged, measured and released upriver.




WEATHER can be bad on opening day of Trout Season

This is part of the continuing program by the ministry to upgrade the fishing. There will be one more column after this one before the season opens and I will try to pass on some helpful hints for those who wish to get out and get one fo the wily ones.

This week, Rainbow Trout. The best places to get the big ones of course are the takeshore areas, and the streams where these fish come in to the lakes. The further upriver they get, the harder they are to find. Almost any river entering Nottawasga Bay, should prove good, although there are some overs that do not have runs.

Sydenham to Owen Sound, Bighead to Menford, Beaver to Thronbury, Pretty to Collingwood and the Nottawasga to Wasaga Beach are all good and are known as the top rivers, along with the Saugeen to Southampton. There are many others and people have their favourites but suffice it to say that they will all be crowded on opening



Spawn is the most controversial method of fishing, and these spawn sacks should be fished on a number 8 hook or even up to a number 6. A number 4 Mepps or Olympic spinner with the tail dressing will prove good but it must be fished very slowly and on the bottom. If it is just ticking over, then it is fast enough.

In spoons, the alligator in black and red or black and silver should prove a good system. Fish these in pools, casting up to the top and bringing the lure down to the tail of the pool,

Flatfish when trolling fish as deep as you can get them. Once again they must be on the bottom and kicking up puffs of sand or silt. One system not used too often, but' which is excellent, is a number 10 hooks with two artificial eggs on it. This is a real killer, and I have seen fifteenpound Trout taken on this rig and have hooked ten-pounder

Worms are not often used for these huge Rainbow Trout, but the small-sized marshamllows, one on a number six hook, have accounted for some real good fish, often as big as they come.

Fly fishing gear can be effective with streamers, but anyone using this type of gear already knows how to use it, and it is too detailed to go into here. I will gladly talk to anyone about it by phone or person it they want further

One rig that is common in the U.S.A. but is not too prevalent here, is the Okie Drifter. It is not readily available on the Canadian market, but they should work here the same as in the U.S. rivers. The Okie is an aritificial spawn in 16 colours and four sizes. It is used with enough weight to keep it on bottom, yet allows a somewhat natural drut. The diagram shows the setup
