

ENGINE STAYS "TURNED ON"?

If any trouble symptoms

Get the lead out? Fuel for thought

Should you be using unleaded fuel in your car? If you've been asking yourself that question in the interest of protecting the environment, the an-

swer may not be simple. New-model cars with catalytic converters should use the unleaded fuel to protect the converter. Some cars without converters still may be run with unleaded gas, if the manufacturer recommends.

Owners of older models with low compression engines may or may not be able to use unleaded fuel safely. Those who would like to try it are advised to buy a tankful. If there is no engme knock, then your car can use the fuel safely. But should you hear the knock, indicating preignition or detonation, then go back to your regular brand of gasoline.


