Hornby supports new nursery school

By September, Hornby Community Centre will be filled with toys and books and the laughter of children; plans for a non-profit, co-operative nursery school are on the drawing board.

The ministry of community and social services is now processing the preliminary application for the nursery school.

April 28, parents from the Ashgrove-Hornby area met to discuss this project.

"It's a family thing," summarized Karen Midwinter, consultant, and a qualified nursery school teacher.

Donations of cash and equipment are needed but a contribution of time would be especially appreciated. Minor renovations must be completed prior to the school opening.

From September, 1976 to June, 1977, morning programmes will be held Tuesday through Thursday from 9 am to 11:30 am, and afternoon sessions are scheduled for Tuesdays and Wednesdays, 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

A supervisor, requiring a degree in Early Childhood Education, will be paid \$15 per session to teach and play with the children. Fee reductions are offered for parents who regularly assist the supervisor once a week or once bi-weekly.

A board of directors, voted in at the public meeting, are responsible for hiring the supervisor. Offices are held by Pat Thornton, president; Karen Midwinter, vice-president; Selma Sheldon, secretary; Cliff Evans, treasurer; Sue Hewitt, registrar.

The board was pleased by community response; only financial problems are parents. Inquiries have been made to Wintario for a grant and in the future, fund-raising projects will be held.

The initial cost of opening the school, based on research done at Maple Nursery School in Georgetown, was estimated at \$800 for supplies. A daily charge of \$8 is charged for the Hornby hall. Additional funds are needed to insure the children against injury on school property, and pay the supervisor.
