GDHS girls soccer

As a strong supporter of more organized sports activities for female athletes, this reporter is pleased to reveal that an inter-school girls soccer programme has been introduced to GDHS and other Halton area schools. The woman responsible for this turn of events is none other than Mrs. Sheena Kewley, well known in Georgetown for her interest in a multitude of sports.

The idea for the league came about towards the end of last fall's girls field hockey season. Mrs. Kewley, who is deeply involved in the Georgetown Minor Soccer program, felt that the GDHS female athletes needed just such a spring outlet for their talents and proceeded from there. Halton coaches were con-

tacted by Mrs. Kewley and were found to be receptive to the idea. Mavis O'Neil, the head of the Girls Physical Education Department at GDHS took over from there and brought the subject up at a Halton Physical Education Department Head meeting, held some time ago, and again, the programme was supported.

T.A. Blakeleok High School of Oakville, took over the actual organization of the league and flyers, describing the proposed league, were sent out to Halton schools. Affirmative responses were received from GDHS, Perdue and Queen Elizabeth Park High School of Oakville and Nelson and Lord Elgin High Schools of Burlington. These are the teams that will make up the league.

Each team will play a five-game schedule, from May 25 to June 8, then tangle in a round-robin tournament to decide the Halton Championship. Each school will field but one team, composed of their best Junior and Senior players.

The girls at GDHS have taken to the idea completely and Mrs. Kewley has set up a rugged practice schedule, two to three sessions a week, leading up to the beginning of the league season. Exhibition games are currently being put together so that hopefully the girls will be able to get into actual game conditions prior to their determined testing. Another feature has been added to Georgetown's athletic cap, thanks to the initiative of Mrs. Sheena Kewley.
