Rebels track team aims for Haltons

It was a busy week for the GDHS track and field team as 50 members competed in the Rebel Invitational, held at Sheridan College in Oakville last Wednesday, and 14 Rebels journeyed to Waterloo last weekend to take part in the Waterloo Warrior Invitational. In their own meet, the Rebs made some gains over last year, as they finished in second place, behind White Oaks High School of Oakville. White Oaks had 537 points, Georgetown compiled 403 points, Lord Elgin of Burlington, notched 337 points; Milton High School had 204 points, and Perdue High School of Oakville trailed the field, managing just 172 points.

Over 200 students from the various schools participated in the meet and while sunshine was the order of the day, a stiff wind did hamper some events. The Rebs' girls team took top spot, while the boys team placed second to White Oaks. Several Georgetown athletes had splendid performances at Sheridan, despite the wind factor. Claire Galbraith was first in the Midget girls 100 metres, second in the discus and a member of two winning relay teams, the Midget girls 4x100 relay and the Open girls 4x400 relay.

Cathy Clark won the Junior girls 1500 metre race, was a member of the winning team in the Junior girls 4x100 event and similarly, helped the girls Open 4x400 relay team to victory. Doris Tichel won the Midget girls 200 metre race and was on the winning teams in the Midget girls 4x100 relay and the Open 4x400 relay. Sue Alexander was the fourth member of the Open 4x400 relay winners, while Meredith McLaren and Tina Gibbs rounded out the Midget 4x100 relay team. Other members of the Junior girls 4x400 relay team included, Heather Clarke, Sue Alexander and Wendy Tancoo.

Other members of the Midget girls team who did well were Cathy DeHueck and Joan Lindsey, who finished fourth and fifth, respectively in the 400 metre race; Jenny Thompson, who won the 1500 metre race, in her best time ever, 5:20.7; Heather Rogers, who placed third in the 1500 metres; and Sue Douglas and Chris Lawrie, who placed first and fourth, respectively in the girls shotput.

In the Midget boys division, first place standings were garnered by Ian Clark, who took the 1500 metre race in the splendid time of 4:19.1; Hugh Wright, who hurled the discus, 37.54 metres, and Gary Nickerson, who won the 200 metres in a time of 25.5 seconds. Wayne Doell and John Warnock were fourth and fifth, respectively in the 400 metre event.

Public school wrestlers Tears, trophies carry day

Perhaps organized confusion might be the best way to describe the scene last Thursday at the GDHS gym, as the annual Rebel Public School Wrestling Tournament, for grades five and six, took centre stage. Over 143 wrestlers from area public schools, representing the largest turnout in the tourney's five-year history, grappled for awards.

The enthusiasm displayed by all was contagious and Rebel wrestling coach Bob McKay, couldn't get over it. Cheers rent the air all afternoon, the respective winners were congratulated and the despondent losers consoled but what made the afternoon so successful was the spirit of competition emanating from the young matmen.

Wrigglesworth Public School, coached by John and Brian Pendergast, emerged as the eventual champions as they dethroned St. Francis of Assisi Separate School, winners of the last two tournaments. Wrigglesworth topped all with 155 points; St. Francis was second, with 101 points; Joseph Gibbons was third with 65 points, Glen Williams was fourth with 48 points; Park finished fifth with 42 points, Harrison was sixth with 33 points, Holy Cross was seventh with 30 points and Kennedy trailed all, compiling 24 points.

Hibbons were presented to the top four placings in each weight class and the recipients were introduced to the spectators. In the 59 lb. weight class, Mike Moore of St. Francis was first, brother Jeff Moore, also of St. Francis, was second, third place went to Glen Puckering of Glen Williams and Scott Russell of Kennedy finished fourth.

In the 71 lb. weight class, Tom Campbell of Wrigglesworth emerged as champion. Stan Smith of Harrison was second, Doug Gillespie of Kennedy placed third and David Longo of St. Francis placed fourth.

At 74 lbs., Kevin Gillespie of Wrigglesworth took top honours, Barry Stone of St. Francis was second, Jeff Crossman of Harrison was third and Don Gilbert of Joseph Gibbons placed fourth.

In the 76 lb. weight class, Kevin Wilcocks of Glen Williams was first, Kevin Franks, also of Glen Williams was second, Pat Delguidice of Harrison was third and Dave Doucette of Joseph Gibbons placed fourth.

At 80 lbs. Daryl Weir of Wrigglesworth topped the field, Ken McLusky of St. Francis placed second, Rob Rush of Park was third and Dave Forbes of Wrigglesworth finished fourth.

In the 85 lb. weight class, Shawn Zuber of Wrigglesworth was first, Bob Bingham of Wrigglesworth placed second Ian Seaton of Joseph Gibbons was third and Gord Doig of Park placed fourth.

Ontario Outdoors Plenty of places to fish in Metro

A few areas where Trout are available for the "Day" fisherman. These areas are under the auspices of the Metro Region Conservation Authority. Albion Hills: 5 miles north of Bolton on Hwy. No. 50. Bruce Mills: 2 miles east of Don Mills Road on the Gornly, Stouffville Road. Claremont: 2 miles east of Broughm on Hwy. 7 and 14 miles north to Westney Road. Heart Lake: 4 miles north of Brampton on Heart Lake Road. Rental boats are available here. Baits are restricted to worms and flies apparently. Glen Haffy: On Airport Road, south of Mono Mills at Glen Haffy there are two stocked ponds which are restocked several times a week. There is a two-fish limit and the baits once again are limited to worms and flies. With the Walleye Season open we are now able to aim at more fish species. Remember the season opens on Nipissing on May 24 and areas 14, 15, 18 and 26 on the 15 of May.

The well-known Rapala lures are sure fire on a large variety of fish, especially Walleye. But when that fails there is a little something that will tip the scales in your favour. That is the extra wiggle of the Jointed Rapala. This lure is relatively new, and comes in the No. 7 size 2 1/2 inches long. The colours are gold, blue, silver and fluorescent red. Pike Senon is almost the same as Walleye, and the above lures with the addition of spoons will get you into a battle with one of these great game fish. With all the fishing around us we tend to forget the small game season. Grounds are open, and the season is open. Now is the time to hunt them, before the field grass gets high. Local regulation should be checked for allowable calibres of guns and for licensure. Winchester has a great new cartridge out in the 22 line. Identified as the "Dynampoint .22 Rimfire cartridge" it has a 40 grain "semi-hollow" point bullet. The dynampoint has a unique mushrooming effect, and I will be trying them out in the near future. I will report on it further at that time. Check with farm owners and often they will be glad to be rid of these pests. Many farmers use gasoline lures in the holes to get these varmints out of their fields. Don't let anyone tell you that hunting groundhogs is cruel. It is a far better way than blowing them up in dens. Maybe I will see you out there in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
