

New information halts work on Cameron Street

The reconstruction of Cameron Street, approved by the town's works committee last week, may not be going through after all.

The works committee has asked that its request for \$18,900 for reconstruction of Cameron Street be withdrawn

and that the committee be given a further opportunity to study the problem.

The late about-face came at Monday night's council meeting. Chairman of the committee, Mike Armstrong, told council that the town's

engineer had received new information in a letter received that afternoon which made a further examination of the matter necessary.

That will come at the works committee's next meeting on May 31.

Tennis courts are open to the public

Tennis clubs in Halton Hills were a frequent topic of conversation at Monday night's council meeting.

Commenting upon the recommendation by the general administration committee that the Gordon Alcott Tennis Club be permitted to investigate the construction of a club house near the west end of the tennis courts Councillor Dick Howitt warned that the town, before granting permission for construction, should guarantee who the rightful owners of the club house would be.

"We don't want another Budokan Club situation," he stated, referring to the situation which cropped up last year between the town and the Budokan Judo Club over the ownership of judo mats permanently installed in the Rose Room at the Georgetown Memorial Arena.

Chairman of the general administration committee, Les Duby, reported that all aspects of ownership of the change house, if and when it is constructed, would be thoroughly investigated.

Later in the meeting Councillor Pat McKenzie

commented upon difficulties some Acton residents had been having in determining when public hours on Acton's tennis courts were. The courts are not solely used by the Acton Tennis Club, he commented, but many people were unsure of when the public hours were.

Glen Gray, recreation

director for the town, who was at the Monday night meeting of council, explained that the summer schedule of recreational programs which will be distributed by his department in the near future will outline the hours at the Acton courts, plus a sign will be put up soon at the courts.

The Ontario Lottery Corporation from time to time has territories come available in various parts of the Province for the distribution of Wintario tickets.

A distributor is required to be actively engaged on a full time basis in the operation of the distributorship, each distributor must employ adequate sales personnel, and maintain sound accounting and clerical office practices.

Wintario distributors are independent businessmen working on a commission basis. A distributor is required to pre-pay for Wintario tickets and re-sell them to the 500 or so Wintario retail outlets in his territory. The current commission structure for each draw is 2 1/2 cents per Wintario ticket for the first 100,000 tickets and 2 cents each on the remaining Wintario tickets sold.

In accordance with an agreement with Olympic Lottery, Wintario distributors presently act as wholesale distributors for Olympic Lottery tickets as well.

Sales reports and audited financial statements will be required by the Corporation.

At present vacancies exist in territories centered in Toronto, Paris and Windsor. Others may arise in the future and all applications received will be kept on file from which any future vacancies could be filled without further public notice.

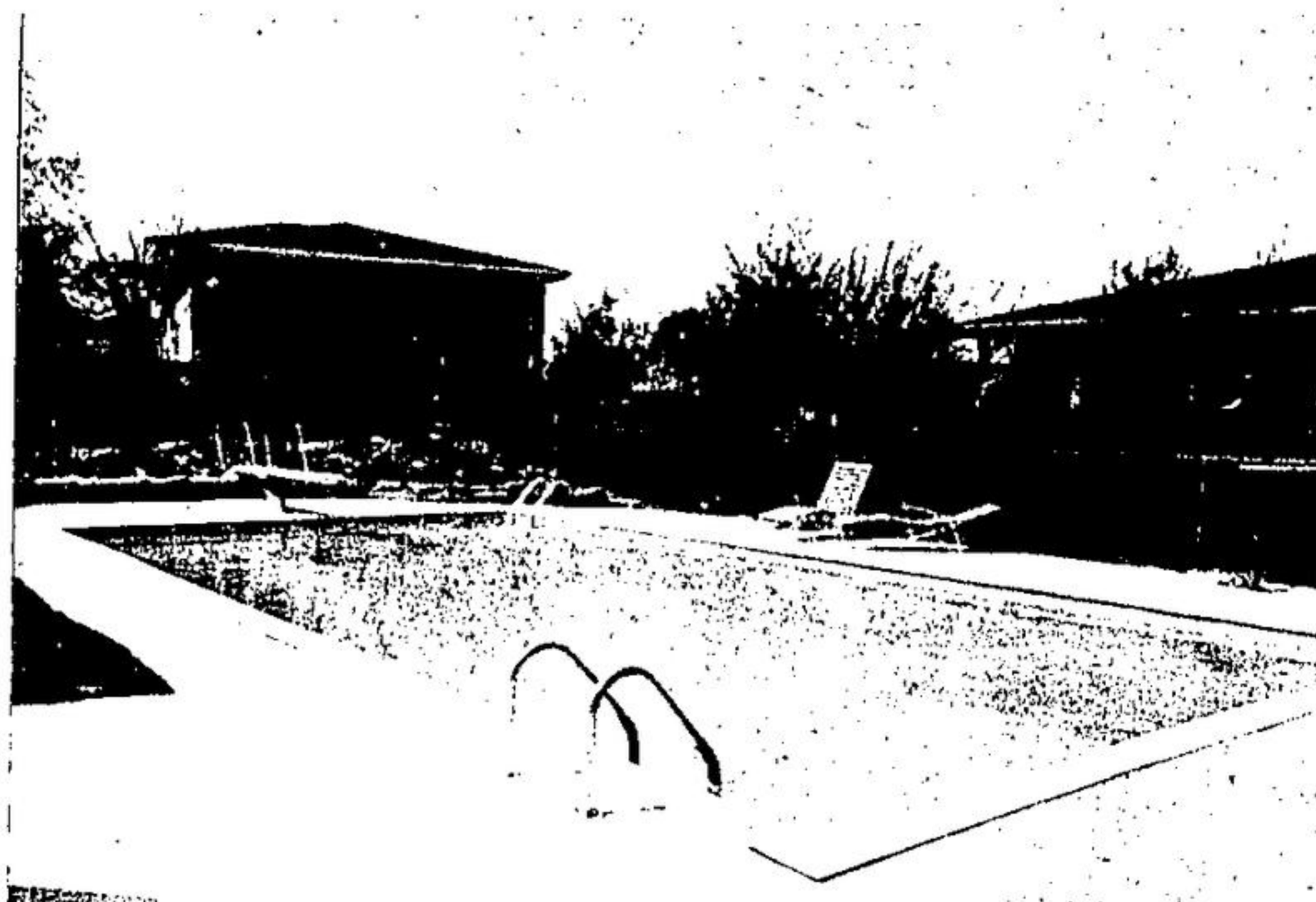
