

Ontario Outdoors Gun bill badly drafted

This is a switch, but a nice one. I am writing at this time in the Leslie M. Frost Natural Resource Centre, at Dorset. At 5:30 this morning I was watching the local pair of Loons swimming on the lake, just outside my window. Sure beats watching the neighbours going to work.

The resource centre is available for groups as a training centre in natural resources and also as a retreat, or a point from which to hike to some of the finest country around. The occasion for me is the annual conference of the Outdoor Writers of Canada.

This is still some of the nicest country to be found anywhere and with all of us working at it we can keep it this way.

The sketch with this week's column is by Kevin Pottruff, and seems to sum it all up, the desire to be outdoors and for us older folk, the chance to get back that feeling that we had that comes from that outdoor experience.



Further news on the "Peace and Security" Bill or Bill C-83: The Canadian Wildlife Federation is representing the hunter in parliament and Ken Bryaert of that organization reported of the reaction to their recommendations. In 1963 Warren Allmand tried to get that gun control bill through as a private member's bill and failed. Senator Cameron took it up in 1971 and it went onto Leggett, an once again as a private members bill. Finally it is now before the house.

The Conservatives, as of Friday May 14 had received 1,300,000 letters and petitions against the bill. The Liberals are not telling what they have received. The lawyers for the C.W.F. say it is a badly drafted and badly conceived bill. I spoke this past weekend with George Clavelle, vice-chairman of the Gun Legislation Committee of the C.W.F., and he expressed his concern over the many unknown factors in the bill.

If C-83 is passed, you will have to fill out a form, that as yet is still not described. You will need two guarantors, as yet of an unknown status, and pay a fee which also has not yet been stated.

Order in Council can make amendments at any time, at any future date, and when that change is published in the "Canada Gazette" it is as of that date, LAW, Will Mr. Allmand register alcohol? It makes as much sense as gun registration, because to talk gun abuse is to talk alcohol abuse, and that is a direct quote from George Clavelle, who is an inspector with the police force.

On May 13 (last Thursday) an amendment was made to Bill C-83. Native people and those who trap for a living will be exempt from the bill, and other concessions are being made. Warren Allmand has 96 stenographers trying to handle the load of work caused by concerned people writing in on Bill C-83. This is about 2,200 to 2,400 letters a day.

Write to your MP and ask two questions requesting an answer, on the peace and security bill. And here is one final word that I am sure that all of you should take note of. Ross Milne, Liberal, will hold a further meeting in Orangeville on either June 2 or the 14. I will give you the date when it is confirmed. At that meeting Commissioner Nicholson WILL speak. Keep in touch, keep in tune with ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
