Since Julie over the popular Mill Street restaurant from Marie Howlett on April first, she has maintained the tradition of preparing two different kinds

of homemade soup daily. "Cooking is not work-it's a joy to create something," said Julie, graduate of a gourmet cooking course at Centennial Ollege, "Euch and every soup turns out a little different than last time. I always add something."

that thekitchen is clean." " "We don't wear uniforms-they're too starchy and severe," she added. "We try to maintain an air of friendliness and keep everything casual."


