What's in the Soup Pot today?

Since Julie took over the popular Mill Street restaurant from Marie Howlett on April first, she has maintained the tradition of preparing two different kinds of homemade soup daily.

"Cooking is not work—it's a joy to create something," said Julie, graduate of a gourmet cooking course at Centennial College. "Each and every soup turns out a little different than last time. I always add something."

Another favourite are the generous salad plates: roast beef, ham, cottage cheese and egg garnished with pineapple, fruit salads in season, or side orders.

There are a wide variety of breads bagels, brown or white rolls, knishers — to enjoy with soup or a sandwich filling. Local caterer Denise Malcolmson bakes the rolls, butter tarts and fruit pies.

Every two weeks there are specials to look forward to: lasagna and trifle tomorrow; goulash Friday and homemade meat pies on Saturday.

Julie gets calls from customers wondering what's cooking for the special, and many have asked her for recipes. However, some of her recipes are treasured family secrets.

When asked what the most popular item on the menu was, Julie answered, "Everything."

Lunchtime is the busiest time at the Soup Pot.

"Sometimes there are people lined up outside waiting to get in—especially Thursdays and Fridays," explained Julie, who wishes there was room to seat more than 24 hungry clients.

Open weekdays 8:15 am for the breakfast crowd, the Soup Pot closes at 3 pm. Monday through Wednesday, but the staff are on duty until 8:30 pm Thursdays and Fridays.

Another idea of Julie's is to open the Soup Pot for Sunday afternoon tea, featuring scones, crumpets, jams and other desserts.

Julie, her "right hand" Kathy Gordon, and part-time staff members Dorothy Few, Mary Rowe, Sue White and Louise Boisvenue put a lot of effort into making the Soup Pot a pleasant meal-time retreat.

"We try to make it cozy" said Julie, who can be seen chopping vegetables for soup or dressing the salads in the

kitchen from the dining area. "Customers can watch how everything is prepared—we start from scratch—and know that the kitchen is clean."

"We don't wear uniforms—they're too starched and severe," she added. "We try to maintain an air of friendliness and keep everything casual."

They succeed in doing just that. The Soup Pot, is air-conditioned, spotless, brightly decorated and, the best part, the meals have reasonable prices.
