My largest was eleven (11) pounds and measured 38" inches in length. We last fish that we couldn't troll or that bit off. Our main interest was Walleye, and we don't use leaders for them. Sometimes Pike will have a lure and bite off the line. Hence the need for sensitive fingers and quick strike when you sense this action by the Pike.

This coming weekend should see excellent Walleye fishing in that part of the country, even though some limits were taken last weekend. In case you are interested, almost all the fish were taken on a good joint, Rapala, even the 30 pound Pike that was hooked by an older man from Hamilton. The rest were taken on Yellow Jigs, fished slow and easy on bottom, and this includes my Pike.

The new owners of the Key Marina on No 89 Hwy at the Key River are running an excellent outfit with overnight accommodation available as well as boats and motors.

Jessie still runs Key Harbour Lodge at the mouth of the Key River and last weekend, hosted 32 fishermen from the Ford plant in Oakville. So far as I am concerned the Key River offers some of the best of ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

In the Junior boys division, Mark Dodge also had an excellent day and he won the championship by setting records in the shotput, with a heave of 10.63 metres, in the 60 metre dash, with a time of 8.5 seconds and the 200 metre dash, with a time of 29.1 seconds. Donnie Pickett and Dana

Taras tied for second in the boys championship.

Mary Lynn Morrow was declared champion in the Intermediate girls division but her title was surely challenged as six girls tied for second. They included, Margo Craig, Marcie Hayes, Dorene Lendvay, Kim Clements, Kelly Grant and Kim Hurren.

Allan Barber and Richard Griffiths tied for the Intermediate boys championship, Glenn Sharpe finished as runner-up, but Barber also got his name in the record books. He set a school record with a time of 29.9 in the 200 metre dash and also handled the 80 metre hurdles in the record time of 13.5 seconds.

championship. She set new school records in the 100 metre dash, a time of 14.0 seconds; the 200 metre dash, a time of 30.5 seconds; and the 400 metre run, a time of 69.8 seconds.
