Acton youth satisfactory after being hit by car

The condition of Derek Dawkins, 3, of 95 Agnes St. is satisfactory reports Guelph General Hospital where the boy was taken after being struck by a car May 20 in front of 80 Bower St. in Acton.

He is suffering from a broken left femur and a concussion, reports the hospital.

The accident occurred at 7 p.m. when the child ran into the roadway and was struck by a car driven by Marcel Fryters, 145 Mill St. E. in Acton.

In an accident Monday evening on Hwy. 7 west of Norval where the road makes a sharp curve, damages totalled \$3,500 when a east bound car driven by Joao Rego of Brampton left the road, went through the guard rail and

struck a hydro pole and some fencing.

Details of the mishap which happened at 8:45 p.m. were incomplete at press time although it is believed that Rego and two male passengers were taken to Peel Memorial Hospital, treated in emergency and released.
