Rep team rule hurts Senior Rebs

The GDHS Senior Soccer Rebs were knocked out of contention for All-Ontario honours last Friday afternoon at Victoria Park in Brampton, when they dropped a tight 3-2 decision to Lorne Park in the OFSSA Peel-Halton preliminary round. The game itself, as described by Rob Coach Jack Bertelson, was a classic but a controversy that brewed earlier in the season cropped up again and marred what had so far been a fine season for the Georgetown team.

The Halton Board had decreed that no rep soccer players on high school teams. This was done with the understanding, that OFSSA officials would be enforcing the same rules for All-Ontario play. The Halton schools obeyed the directive—with the exception of White Oaks, who subsequently forfeited their games—and the pattern was set.

The pattern was torn asunder, however because of last week's game between Georgetown and Lorne Park and now, everything is up in the air.

The Peel schools decided to disregard the rep player ban and the team that bumped off the Rebs' last week was liberally sprinkled with rep players. The Peel coach, who was well aware of the situation, but informed Lorne coach Brown, that the Peel schools were not the least interested in the OFSSA ban on rep players as they had no intention of going further than the Peel-Halton round regardless of its outcome.

As the situation now stands, because Georgetown lost the game and similarly because Lorne Park won the game even though they used rep players, there will be no OFSSA All-Ontario Peel-Halton challenge.

The game itself was closely contested from the opening whistle and at halftime, was deadlocked at 1-1. Both teams played very disciplined games, and excellent passing and set-ups highlighted play.
