

Larry Nicholls to head Jaycees



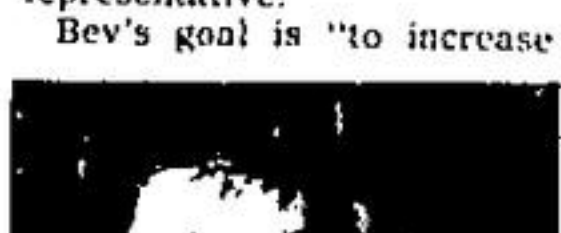

Centennial students return from visit to Ottawa and Quebec City

Canadian history and contemporary culture were introduced to 77 grade eight students from Centennial School, Georgetown, who travelled to Ottawa and Quebec last week.

Two buses full of excited kids left town at 7 a.m. Tuesday, May 24. One returned from Ottawa Thursday, the other continued on to Quebec for a two-day stay.

En route to Ottawa, the students had a nostalgic taste of Old Fort Henry. Conveniently housed at Carleton University, they visited the Mint, National Art Gallery, Parliament Buildings, Sparks Street Mall and the Museum of Science and Technology, during a guided tour of the capital.

Visiting Upper Canada Village, an authentic pioneer settlement, was a

refreshing break in the long journey home for the students who departed Thursday. Those who visited Quebec saw the National Assembly, the Musée du Fort, the Citadelle, and one of the most popular attractions, St. Jean Port Joli-home of the wood carvers.

Accompanied by a guide from the Chateau Frontenac, they had a walking tour of quaint Old Quebec and explored other parts of the city. Most meals were eaten at the Laurende Hotel, they were booked into, but dinner at a French restaurant one night provided a culinary diversion from the usual fare.

After passing the Montreal Olympic site Saturday morning, the next stop was Georgetown.

"Each has a different idea about which part of the trip was most enjoyable," said Family Studies teacher Lois Gluck, who joined forces with principal Ron Chatten, parent Pat Robbins, teachers Don Grigg, Grace Gimpel and Eileen Spencer, to supervise the trip.

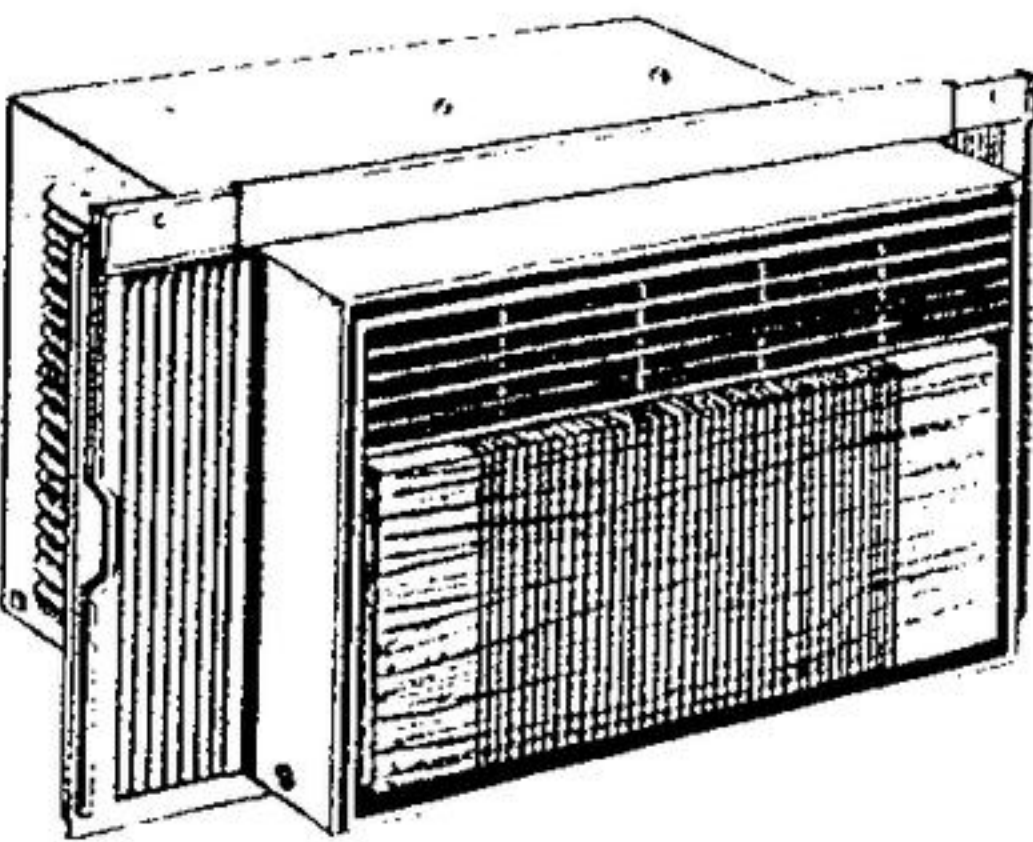
James Richardson, minister of national defence and Chancellor and President of

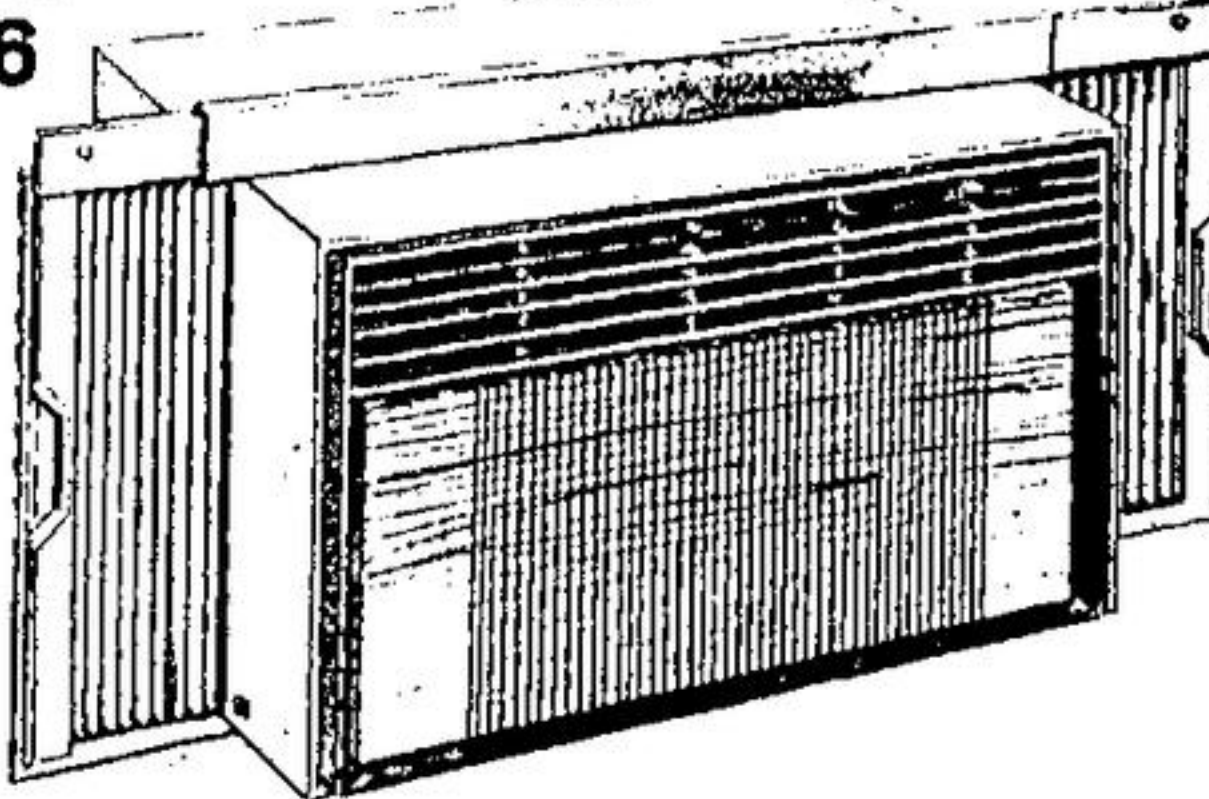
