Clark cracks OFSSA

Records fell at a breathtaking pace at last weekend's OFSSA provincial meet, held Friday and Saturday at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium, and the eight members of the GDHS track and field team more than held their own.

1,846 competitors, from 400 of the province's 650 schools took part in the two-day event, that was won by Michael Power High School of Toronto for the fifth time in six years. To say that some of the best high schools athletes in Canada were highlighted would be remiss as eight Canadian interscholastic standards were set. As well, 20 provincial records fell by the wayside and two previous standards were tied.

Donna Metcalfe, head coach of the GDHS track and field team, described her charges' efforts as "... Just fantastic."

Ian Clark led the Georgetown

team by winning the Midget boys 3,000 metre run in a provincial record time of 9:03, the third time in as many years that Ian has run at a record setting pace.

The other members of the GDHS team were of the female gender and this represents a tremendous improvement over past years. Previously, no GDHS female had made it to the finals in any event, but this year, both the Midget girls and Open girls relay teams, as well as Cathy Clark and Meredith McLaren made it to the coveted starting berth.

The Midget relay team, composed of Meredith, Claire Galbraith, Doris Tichel and Tina Gibbs, wound up in first spot but ran the event in a time of 50.9 seconds, their fastest clocking of the year.

Georgetown's Cathy Clark was another local who saw yeoman service. On Saturday, she was involved in four races. She ran in her heat as well as the final in the Junior girls 800 metre race and, as a member of the Open girls 4x400 metre relay team, was asked to do likewise.

Cathy won her heat in the 800 metres but had to settle for a fifth place finish in the final. The race was run at a torrid

pace and the winner, Barb Douglas of Kipling High School set a new Canadian mark of 2:10.8.

The Open girls relay team was also denied top laurels, but finished second, with the excellent time of 4:02. This represented their best effort of the year and is remarkable in that two Midget girls, Claire Galbraith and Doris Tichel, ran in the event. Sue Alexander was the other member of the GDHS Open girls foursome.

The final GDHS OFSSA athlete, Jenny Thompson had a disappointing outing. Jenne was entered in the Midget girls 1,500 metre race, but was jostled somewhat at the start and never did regain her composure and finished eight out of 15 and out of the running for the final.

All in all, Georgetowners did exceedingly well considering the competition and deserve hearty congratulations.
