Rebels Halton champs

The GDHS Senior soccer Rebels have emerged as the 1976 Halton County Champions in light of their semifinal win last week and their eventual 1-0 final win over the Perdue Panthers last Monday.

The Halton final was played at Oakville's Shell Park and both teams were obviously up for the match and played in true championship fashion. The game was up for grabs, when Georgetown's Mike Sharples, on a fine individual effort with less than a minute to play, scored the winning goal.

Georgetown had beaten Perdue earlier in the year and had also managed a tie against the Oakville squad but nothing was being taken for granted as the game got underway. Both teams played tough, aggressive soccer and with neither crew giving an inch, play flowed back and forth over the pitch.

In the dying minutes, the Rebels stepped up their attack and it was a Perdue defensive

miscue that caused the winning marker. Sharples picked up the ball just past midfield on the right side. As he homed in on the Oakville net, the Panther defenders were bunched in the centre of the field, obviously expecting Mike to pass. When the realization finally hit home that Sharples was going to carry the play, it was too late as the Georgetowner barrelled his way in and decided the issue with a hard, low shot.

Rebel coach, Jack Brown, obviously pleased with the win, admitted that a non-decision, on his part, should get credit for the victory. Sharples had been bothered by a knee ailment for quite some time, and in the first half of Monday's game it was obviously bothering him. Brown had a replacement ready to take to the field but decided to leave things as they stood. His non-decision paid off and Mike, soreknee and all, put the final touch on a great year for the Rebels.

While the whole team deserves credit for the championship, it should be mentioned that Pat Shanks had a great game in the Rebel nets. Shanks played a strong, aggressive match, that earned praise from the Perdue Coach.

At the Halton Soccer semifinals, played in Georgetown last Wednesday afternoon, the Rebel 2-1 victory over Burlington-Central was sweet indeed as the locals got involved in a marathon tussle that had it gone any further, might have been threatened with darkness.

It was a superb game, highlighted by defensive play, that purists might have wanted left undecided. Unfortunately, or fortunately, depending on your ilk, a winner had to be decided and that honour fell on the weary shoulders of the Georgetown Rebels after approximately two and a-half hours involving regulation time, two ten-minute overtime periods, a

team penalty kick situation and finally, thankfully for all concerned, an individual penalty kick scenario that decided the issue.

Burlington Central held a 1-0 lead at halftime and deservedly so. The Rebels appeared disorganized at times and just couldn't put together a concerted offensive effort.

Another plus in Burlington's first-half game was that the visitors got on the ball first a majority of times. The Rebels, as has been their penchant throughout this season, pulled themselves together at halftime and were a different team as the whistle signalled commencement of play. The Georgetowners were now in command and midway through the second half, Jeff Lockwood scored to knot the contest. At the end of regulation time, the score still stood at 1-1 and two, ten-minute overtime periods failed to alter the situation.

The team that scored the most goals would be declared the winner. So much for the well laid plans of mice and men, for after this concerted battle, both teams had scored four times and still, nothing had been decided. Each squad then picked an individual sniper. The respective goalies screwed up their faltering nerves, and it should be mentioned, their fatigued limbs and prepared for the high noon showdown. Burlington-Central had the first shot, but their gunning came up with blanks as his shot completely missed the net. Georgetown's Victor Koch, then took his turn in the limelight and he reprieved faltering hearts, when his blast found the mark.

Although they were denied an OFSAA Provincial bid, the GDHS Senior Rebels concentrated on the task at hand and came through with flying colours. Congratulations are due to coach Jack Brown and the Rebel players for fine season.

Rookie Rebelettes tied for 2nd

Georgetowners are renowned for their competitiveness and the newly formed GDHS girls soccer team, competing in the equally infant Halton County Girls Interscholastic Soccer League, are proving no exception to the rule.

Last week the Rebelettes swept two games, 2-1 over Perdue on Tuesday and 1-0 over Nelson on Thursday, and find themselves tied for second place with T.A. Blakelock High School of Oakville, just one game behind front running Queen Elizabeth Park High School, also of Oakville.

has come at the hands of Q.E. Park. Q.E. Park and Blakelock clashed last Thursday, with Q.E. Park emerging victorious by a 5-2 count.

The Nelson game, according to Rebelette coach, Sheena Kewley, was not as close as the 1-0 score would indicate, mainly because, although the Georgetown lassies carried the play, they had trouble controlling the ball. The ball seemed lighter than usual and appeared to have a mind of its own as it careened hither-sketter all over the pitch.

Charlene Milton scored the Georgetown goal, while Debbie Wilson and Sylvia

Martin shared netminding duties. Mrs. Kewley had special words of praise for the work of Maria Sequens at fullback and her halfback line of Joan Gilmer, Beth Kewley and Bonnie-Lea Beckett. According to Mrs. Kewley, they are the pick of the league.

Regardless of a team's final regular season standing, all five league entries qualify for the Halton Championship round-robin tournament, to be staged this Saturday at Shell Park in Oakville. The Rebelettes have to be considered serious title contenders along with Blakelock and, of course, Queen Elizabeth Park.

Centennial and GDHS wrestlers strong in meet

Thirteen Georgetown wrestlers, supervised by Centennial Public School's wrestling coach, Jim Hall, took part in the first ever, pre-junior Ontario wrestling championships, held at the University of Toronto's Benson

Building last Saturday. The championships were the grand finale in 15 weight classes following a series of eight regional championships held since last September. The championships were confined

to wrestlers, 15 years and under and the four GDHS matmen and their nine Centennial Public School counterparts, captured six of the 15 titles, finished in the number two spot in four categories, had a third, a fourth and a fifth.

The local champions include, Frank Miedjinski of Centennial in the 85 lb. weight class. (Miedjinski has gone undefeated all year); Dean Scallen of Centennial at 103 lbs.; Dave Taggart of Centennial at 148 lbs.; Ken Owens of Centennial at 159 lbs.; and Frank Lenaski and Steve Cropper of GDHS, champions at 92 and 138 lbs., respectively.

Runner-up honours were garnered by Centennials Bill Davis at 92 lbs., Jeff Skingley of Centennial at 138 lbs., David Allan of Centennial at 77 lbs., and Kevin Brown of GDHS at 121 lbs.

Mike Taylor of Centennial finished in the number three position at 72 lbs. (Mike suffered an injury in an earlier bout and couldn't complete the tourney); Joe Ibiak of GDHS was fourth at 115 lbs., while Centennial's, Jamie Burt was fifth at 138 lbs.

This weekend Jim Hall, will be taking a team composed of Centennial wrestlers to compete in the Johnson City Wrestling Tournament in Johnson City, New York.
