The tour was sponsored by the Federation of Agriculture and took two years to get permission to enter the country.

Hong Kong, she told the group, is a series of 200 islands and can be entered by Hawaii. It is populated by millions of

Chinese. A 10-by-12-foot room could house a whole family. There are no family gatherings in the home. The laundry is hung on bamboo poles extended from apartment balconies of home windows.

Two thousand tons of green food come in from Red China every day. Some spend their whole lives on boats. Rice paddies are underwater. There are no chimneys and no heating systems. In some homes the animals live in the basement and the people above.
