# Geminis \$3,000 in hole after first year

The Georgetown Geminis held their annual meeting last Tuesday evening at Cedarvale and 19 people, including press representatives, took part in the proceedings.

At the head of the agenda was the election of the board of directors for the club for the 1976-77 season and as elected, these directors include: Pete Pomeroy, Ken Adams, Norm Lockhurst, Jim Mackie, Bob Girdwood, Cam Boland, Tom James, Doug Coulbeck, Jim Walker, Gerry Osborne, Bob Tost and Stan Larusso. Ian Ward, a member of last

year's directorate, was defeated in his attempt to regain his seat, while Bob Hooper, although nominated, declined to run.

The 1976-77 board of directors will elect an executive committee at its first meeting.

The Geminis closed their books on May 31, although according to their constitution, the fiscal year runs to June 30. They showed a net operating loss of \$3,089 for the 1975-76 season. The report did not include certain club assets or an inventory report on club

equipment, but with the appointment of the chartered accounting firm of Walter Doo for the club's 1976-77 season, audited reports will duly be made available.

Geminis President, Pete Pomeroy—who will not be seeking to head the club this year—made some comments to those attending the meeting that he emphasized should be taken as his personal opinion and not necessarily that of the team.

He noted that the operating deficit incurred by the club in its first year of operation

should serve to silence those armchair critics who accused the club's organizers of embarking on the venture merely as a money-making enterprise. He further pointed out that the club was made a corporation, not to make money, but to protect those involved with the team's operation.

Pomeroy was especially displeased with the current ice rental agreement with the town. Early last year, the club had agreed to inform the town of its financial position, but as Pomeroy sees it, "Really, it's none of their business."

He recommended that the new directorate, seriously look into this side of the operation. Pete also felt that the current ice rental agreement, which involves a split of the gate with the town, was unfeasible. He suggested that the Geminis group settle on a "fair hourly agreement" with the town and not accept anything less.

In closing, Pomeroy expressed the feeling that it was a very satisfying year and went out of his way to thank those involved with the team. Everyone who helped, in any way, he noted, contributed to the club's first year success.

# Centennial wins Halton school championships

The Halton County Public School Board held its annual track and field meet last Tuesday at E. C. Drury School in Milton and in the meet, in which 18 new records were set and seven others tied, Centennial Public School won the Tier "A" competition with 258 1/2 points and Fairview Public School won the tier "B" championship, compiling 172 points.

Stewarttown Public School finished second, behind Centennial rolling up 213 points. All told, Centennial athletes set seven new county standards while tying four others; Stewarttown competitors broke four records and matched one other, while seven records were broken and two others tied by the remaining competing schools.

New record setters for Centennial included: Nancy Vetrick in the intermediate girls triple jump, with a leap of 9.40 metres; Hayley Quinn in the Senior girls hurdles, in a time of 12.6 seconds; Sheryl Leinweber in the Senior girls 100 metre dash, in a time of 13.45 seconds; Dave Mison in the Junior boys 60 metre dash, in a time of 8.4 seconds; Matt Phillips in the intermediate boys hurdles, in a time of 12.9 seconds; Brian Davis who won the intermediate boys triple jump with a leap of 9.95 metres and Jeff Skingley, in the intermediate boys 100 metre dash in a time of 12.0 seconds.

Tying established meet standards were: Chris Vetrick in the Senior girls triple jump, with a leap of 9.30 metres; Linda Ferguson, who won the intermediate girls hurdles in a time of 10.0 seconds; Maureen Gale in the Junior girls hurdles, in a time of 10.0 seconds and Teri Lamb, who won the Junior girls long jump by flying through the air for 4.25 metres.

New trend setters for Stewarttown included: Debbie Clark, in the Junior girls 200 metre dash, with a time of 29.5 seconds; Wendy Rogers, in the Senior girls 400 metres with a time of 67.45 seconds; Mark Dodge, in the Junior boys 200 metres, in a time of 28.0 seconds; Wayne Elliott in the Junior boys 400 metres, in a time of 66.2 seconds, while Debbie Clark tied the meet mark by winning the Junior girls 60 metre dash in a time of 8.4 seconds.
