

# Chess mess

This year's GDHS chess championship was held November 20 to December 9, 1975. It was open to all high school students and 29 entered. The tournament was, however, dominated by the more experienced team members as the following list of top scorers shows. The tournament was a 6-round Swiss.

Steven MacLeod had only one difficult game in winning the tournament. Blair Thompson had a good result, losing only to the winner, while the other results were about expected.

**Rounds 5-White: B. Thompson, Black: S. MacLeod**  
This key game matched the only two players with perfect scores. After a well-played opening white slowly loses ground in the end game and loses a piece after 5 hours of play.

The following game is the clinching sixth round encounter. White needed only a draw to win the tournament, while a win by black would have created a 3-way tie for first.

# Halton cattlemen tour Simcoe

About 50 cattlemen from Halton and Peel toured Simcoe County on Thursday, June 17th. The tour left Brampton Fair Grounds at 8:15 a.m. with the first stop in the Beeton area.

Tom Sommers explained his cow-calf operation. He feeds his registered Hereford herd on corn silage and hay with as little automation as possible. Mr. Sommers believes a setup should be as simple and practical as possible.

Feedlot operations made up the rest of the tour. Don Harvey at Cookstown has a low investment finish operation. He feeds Charolais and Charolais-cross steers.

A neighbour, Doug Jebb feeds western cattle in a new pole-barn built to replace the original one which was burned. Bob Carruthers of Avening runs a feedlot comprised of both steers and heifers. Mr. Carruthers doesn't feel that the heifers cause enough loss of gain to justify separating the sexes.

The last stop was at the farm of Beattie Brothers at Stayner. Ross and Irwin Beattie feed 3000 head of cattle on 900 acres. They follow the market trends through the use of a computer. As a diversion from the cattle business, the tour group admired the prize Belgian Geldings owned by Beattie Brothers.

A sparerib dinner was enjoyed at noon between stops at the Nottawasago Inn near Alliston. The tour returned to Brampton at 5:30 p.m.

Geoff Young, Associate Agricultural Representative for Simcoe South, was the tour guide and the man responsible for lining up the tour.

# Six injured in 22-foot plunge to train tracks

Six Toronto men were treated at hospital Wednesday after the car in which they were riding failed to negotiate a curve on Maple Street, crashed through the barrier on the CNR bridge, and fell 22 feet to the railway tracks below. Damages to the car amounted to about \$300. Police said the vehicle was "written off."

Injured in the collision were: Richard Todd Keast, David Alonzo Keast, Richard Raymond Hind, John Philip McElroy, Daniel Baker and William McDonald all of Toronto.

Police reported five other people injured in traffic accidents in the past week.

Gary C. Glaude of 97 Raylawn Cres., was taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital Wednesday after the motorcycle he was driving struck and killed a dog which had run into the path of his vehicle. Glaude was treated at the hospital and released.

Police estimate damage to the motorcycle at \$100.

### TWO TREATED

Two Oshawa residents were treated at hospital after being involved in an accident June 21 at the intersection of Guelph Street and Mountainview Road.

Police identified the injured as: William and Janice Cox both were treated and released.

Police estimate damages at \$1,000 to the Cox vehicle and \$700 to the vehicle of Daniel Cameron 133 Rexway Dr., the other driver in the mishap which occurred in the intersection.

Mountainview Road and Campbell Gate was the scene of an accident June 24 in which five-year-old Angela Webb of 35 Ewing St. was injured but did not require hospital treatment.

Arthur J. Bower of 33 Edward St. was the driver in a mishap in which his car was in collision with another driven by Lynda Webb of 35 Ewing St. Police estimate damages at \$400 to the Bower vehicle and \$350 to the Webb vehicle.

A driver in a single car mishap complained of pain but was not taken to hospital after his car collided with a telephone pole opposite 45 Market St. in Georgetown June 21.

The car driven by Ronald Lincoln of 182 Maple Ave. sustained \$1,500 in damages. The accident resulted in telephone service being disrupted.

### FOUR HIT AND RUN

There were four hit and run collisions, police report.

An unknown driver left the road at 10 Sideroad about four-tenths of a mile east of the Third Line after failing to negotiate a curve and struck a telephone pole causing \$300 in damages.

The municipal parking lot at Main and Mill Streets in Georgetown was also the scene of a hit and run driver who caused \$75 damages to a parked car owned by Jose Raposo Placido, 16 Sargent Road, at about 2 p.m. June 24.

A hit and run driver caused \$100 in damages Tuesday to a parked car owned by Gordon McCutcheon, 69 Nelson Cr. Acton, while the vehicle was at the Station Hotel parking lot on Mill St.

Damages amounted to \$100 for a parked car owned by William B. McArthur, R.R.4 Acton, after it was struck Wednesday by an unknown driver who fled the scene. The accident happened on Church Street East just east of John Street.

Maple Ave. and the south driveway of the town's works department was the scene of an accident June 25 when a car driven by Arthur Klee of Glen Williams sustained \$25 in damages after being in collision with a car driven by Duncan Robinson, of Islington. The Robinson car escaped damage.

Failed steering is the reported cause of an accident June 22 when a car ran out on Sideroad about a half-mile east of the Eighth Line. Damage to the two door 3--3top driven by Joan E. Wright of 7 Heather Court, was \$500.

Trafalgar Road, just north of Steeles Avenue, at the turnout to Hornby (Halton Rd. 3A) was the scene of an accident June 25 when a car driven by Ronald Richard Peter of Mississauga, slipped on the wet pavement and ran up on to the island.

### \$500 DAMAGE

Police estimate damage to the Peter vehicle at \$300 and \$200 to four guard posts on the island.

Main and Guelph Streets in Georgetown was the scene of an accident for two Acton residents June 23. A car driven by Lorne E. Ford, 13 Kingham Rd., was in collision with one driven by Jaime E. Avila, 49 Storey Dr. Police estimate damages at \$50 to the Avila vehicle and nil to the Ford vehicle.

Valentina Farms on the 6th Line was the scene of an accident June 22 when an unattended car owned by John McGrath, R.R.1, Limehouse travelled in reverse for about 150 feet before striking the side of a brick barn. Police estimate damage at \$1,000 to the car and \$500 to the side of the barn.

The railroad crossing on Halton Road 3 near 20 Sideroad was the scene of an accident June 19 when a truck driven by Roy Melanson, R.R.1, Milton, was in collision with a car driven by Florence G. Jamieson, One Market St., Georgetown. Police estimate damages at \$300 to each vehicle.

Mountainview Road and Guelph Street was the scene of two accidents almost 24 hours apart.

The first accident occurred June 23 at 8:05 p.m. when a car driven by Guy J. Leary, 43 Faludon Dr. was in collision with one driven by Dean Clive

Beech, 53 Pennington Cres. Police estimate damage at \$250 to the Leary vehicle and \$150 to the Beech vehicle.

Then at 8 p.m. June 24 at the same intersection, a car driven by Stephen D. Gammerson, 86 Prince Charles Dr. was in collision with a car driven by John Terry Stearn of Calgary.

Police estimate damages at \$350 to each vehicle.

Mountainview Road was the scene of an accident June 24 at 8 a.m. when a school bus driven by Margret DeBeer 43 Queen St., was in collision with a car driven by Vernon Mc-

Crea of Haliburton, Ontario. Damages in the collision, which occurred in front of 93 Mountainview Rd., were \$150 to the school bus and \$20 to the McCrea vehicle, police estimate.

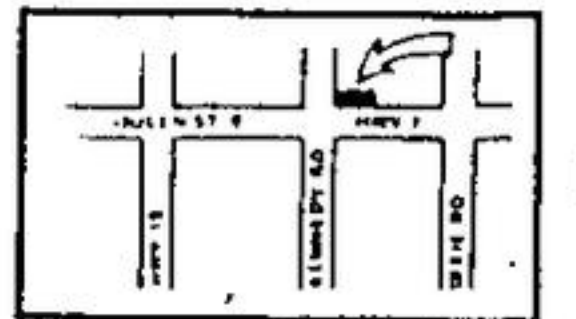
