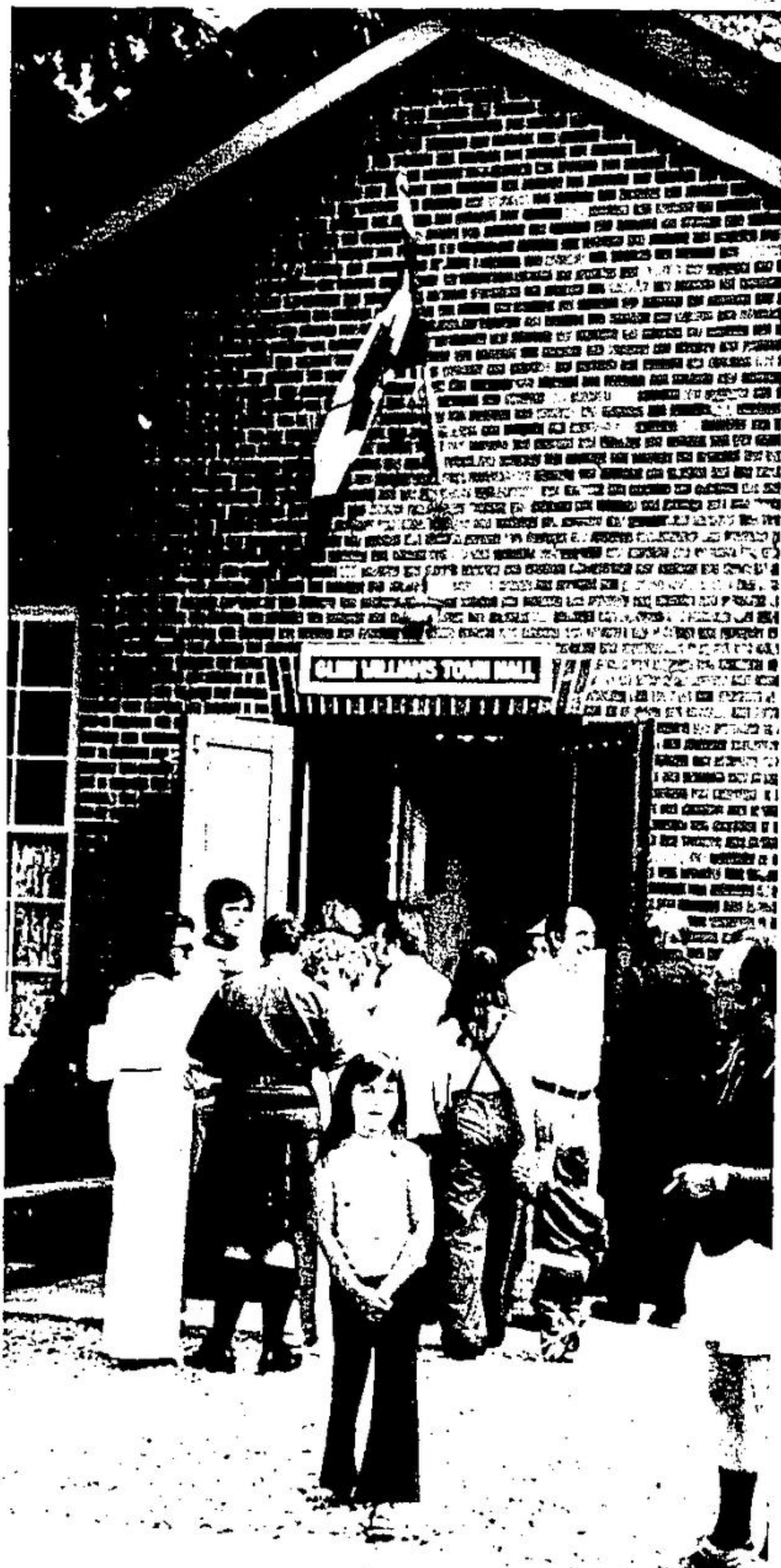


105-year-old Glen Town Hall re-opened



GLEN WILLIAMS TOWN HALL was officially re-opened July 1, after \$25,000 in renovations were completed. The Glen was alive with music and games in celebration.

Dominion Day marked the celebrated re-opening of the 105-year-old Glen Williams town hall.

Two years of labor and \$25,000 transformed the dilapidated red brick building into a modern meeting place. Infrequently used during the past 10 years, the historic hall was without plumbing, the back wall had crumbled, the wooden floor had rotted and the roof leaked.

Federal government Opportunities for Youth and Local Initiative Program grants (totaling \$13,500, plus \$10,000 raised by an auction, a plant and bake sale and public donations), funded the project. Glen Williams trustee Cy Waters, chosen as chairman of the restoration committee, was one of many villagers who invested a great deal of time into renovating the hall.

"We had to completely gut the interior," said Waters, adding that the floor, roof, plumbing and wiring are all new.

The limited space inside the one room structure was well utilized to accommodate a kitchen alcove, washroom facilities, and a mezzanine. Since the walls, floor and ceiling of the well-lit hall is painted white, it appears larger than the actual 44 by 23 foot area.

DISPLAYS

Historic pictures of Glen Williams were displayed in the hall July 1, for the official re-opening.

Jaycee president Larry Nicholls, Georgetown, led the procession to the hall at 3:30 p.m. when Clayton Allen, who was custodian of the hall for 50 years, did the honours as ribbon cutter.

Speeches were delivered by Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed and Mayor Tom Hill. A life-long resident of the Glen, Hill recalled his first public address. As a child of five, he recited a nursery rhyme in the Glen town hall, during a Christmas program.

Recreational activities followed the speeches. Highlighting the afternoon of events was a pet show, judged by Mr. Peter Snider, owner of Wynfield's Kennels in Georgetown. MPP Julian Reed served as master of ceremonies.

Chris Cunningham took the honours in the most unusual pet category with his worm Seamore. Second place went to Lorne Williams and his pet rock, followed closely by owner of a seven-toed cat, Tina Fokluda.

Sean Jenkins' tiny part spaniel Fudge took the prize for the best dressed dog while pets owned by Cindy See and Robin Maybe tied for the being best trained.

LARGEST DOG

Resembling a bear more than a dog, Marty Zillos Newfoundland Brandy was

acclaimed the biggest dog. Sean Jenkins Fudge placed against the smallest canine entrant.

Chris Haines' dog had the shortest tail while a white Samoyed owned by Eileen

featured a safety inspection, a slow race, an obstacle course and a competition for decorated bicycles.

FIREFIGHTERS

Following a demonstration, the Georgetown Volunteer

Firefighters staged a water fight in the street.

At intervals throughout the day, performances were given by local rock band Blue Steel. Evening entertainment featured square dancing, led by Ed Hazell.

Hungry visitors to the Glen enjoyed snacks from booths operated by the Boy Scouts Association and members of St. Alban's Anglican Church. The latter specialized in homemade pies.

One thousand ticket-holders kept their fingers crossed until 9 p.m. At that time, chairman of the Hall Restoration Committee Cy Waters drew the lucky ticket and announced Elaine Hillman of Glen Williams as the winner of a new car. Recently married, Elaine told the Herald how surprised she was to receive this chance wedding gift. Dozens of other visitors to the Glen carnival returned home \$10 richer as consolation winners in the draw. Tickets were drawn at 15 minute intervals from 4 to 9 p.m.

Residents of Glen Williams, John Minns, who played an important organizational role

in the days festivities, concluded that Dominion Day, 1976, would be memorable for the villagers.



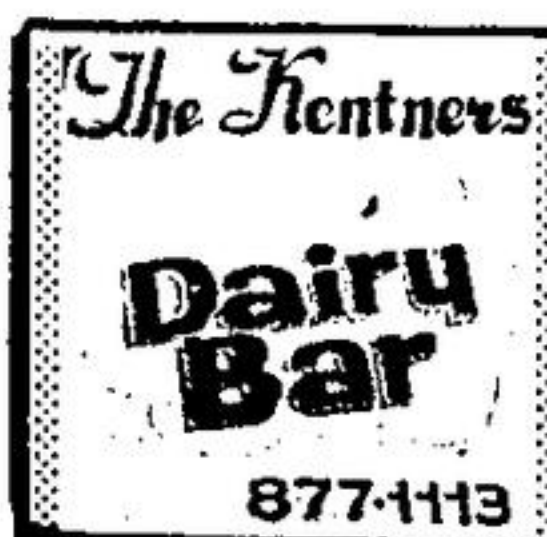
