## Some tips on bass

Well, here it is again, one of the pleasant moments of the week when I can rap with you folk about what's on my mind.

It can be a hard time for me, trying to put down just what I think you may be looking for. Sometimes the words come fast, other times I stare at the typewriter, waiting for it to speak to me.

The fishing has been good for Bass. This is, I think, mainly due to the fact that we have had considerable cloud cover. This puts the Bass in the shallows where most people fish for them. Hence, the good catches. The water colour has been good (a little murky) although the bass have had plenty to eat. This is when you must EXCITE them into striking your offering, by speed control, (various speeds), action control, (various types of

woods. Mind you, I still get out there thrashing the water, but at least I think about taking my own advice. Of course, Walleye fishing is still a major form of recreation at this time, although many persons go out at night for them. I found that they can be caught at any time of day, "IF" you are at the right depth and temperature range. This can be found by trial and error or by depth sounders and temperature probes. Walleye prefer temperatures in the 55-70 degree F. range (15-18 celcius).

**INSECT REPELLENTS:** Look for the one with a high content of "diethyl-meta toluamide". This of course can vary considerably with each brand. Some brands have

Often just leaving a lure sitting on the surface has been enough to bring on a strike from a Large Mouth Bass. Water temperature has a large bearing on the location of fish, and this includes the bass. Large mouth prefer 68-74 degrees Fahrenheit (20 celcius). Small mouth prefer 65-70 degree F (18 celcius).

With the largemouth the "average" depth at which they will be found is 20 to 24 feet in July. They will head to 25 to 30 feet in August. Mind you, these are averages and are a good starting point for your fishing. Of course weather is an important factor, with sunlight, cloud cover and temperature making the greatest difference in location.

This brings up a very interesting subject. "How to preserve a newspaper?" This one is from Richard Smith at the University of Washington. Dissolve a milk of magnesia tablet in a quart of club soda over night. Pour into a pan large enough to hold the paper flat. Soak for an hour, remove and pat dry. This should give a life span of 200 years for the paper. I have newspaper clippings that are only a few years old and they are so yellow and decrepit that they are almost useless. This way you can keep a file of my columns (if they help) and look up at any time in the future. It won't preserve people, sorry.
