Three Georgetown teams take part

The 10th Annual Robbie Tournament, promoted by the Scarborough Minor Soccer Association in aid of Cystic Fibrosis, this year attracted 196 teams - 130 boys and 66 girls - from across Canada and the United States.

Three Georgetown teams took part in the affair, the Mosquito and Pee Wee girls and the Major Mosquito boys.

All three teams met with some success but unfortunately didn't make it to the finals in their division. The Mosquito boys beat Richmond Hill, 2-0 but lost 2-1 to Brampton and 4-2 to Miami. The Mosquito girls beat Pickering, 3-1 but were defeated by Forest Park, 6-0 and Fairfax, Virginia, 3-0. A report on the Pee Wee girls games was to have been handed in, unfortunately it didn't arrive.

The Robbie Tournament was introduced in 1967, when John Frow and John Wimbs, of the Scarborough Minor Soccer Association, decided to run a Pee Wee soccer tournament with the proceeds to be directed to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

John Wimbs son, Robbie, was afflicted with the disease, so it was appropriate that the tournament be named after him.

Since its inception in 1967, the tournament has been extended to cover all age groups for boys and from Mosquito and up for girls. With the exception of Mosquito boys, a division that had 32 teams, all division accepted 16 applications to participate.

Each division of 16 was split into groups of four and each group then played a round robin series. The winner of each group then met in semi-finals to produce divisional finalists.

Girls teams from the United States celebrated the 20th anniversary of their nation by winning all the major events in their category. In the boys category, Wexford won the Atom title, Mississauga walked off with the Minor Bantam crown, Wexford reached the winners circle again by taking the Bantam championship and Buildwood copped the Mosquito title.

The Georgetown Major Mosquito had an unpleasant tournament debut when they lost 2-1 to Brampton.

End to end play highlighted the evenly matched game, with Anthony Oram, on a side-footer, opening the

Georgetown scoring. After the initial Georgetown marker, defensive mistakes allowed Brampton to take control of the game. Georgetown was handicapped somewhat however, as three players, Barry Stone, Peter Haller and Rivy Kennedy were suffering from injuries.

The 2-0 win over Richmond Hill was a decisive Georgetown win. The locals were on top throughout most of the contest and thoroughly deserved the victory Anthony Oram and Gary Lockwood scored the Georgetown counters, while Steve Margets had a good game on defense and Gordie Adams was always an offensive threat. Kirk Warnock was also an offensive threat.

The win over Richmond Hill set the scene for the crucial third game against Miami. Miami had won their first two games but a Georgetown win would have put them in the quarter-finals.

It was just not to be, however, as Miami scored twice in the opening 10 minutes and increased their lead 4-0 before the Mosquitos could get on track. Georgetown fought back on two goals by Gary Lockwood, but the margin of

Standard Products has opened up a considerable margin over the rest of the league in GBA Tyke House League play and last week chalked up three wins to solidify their number one position.

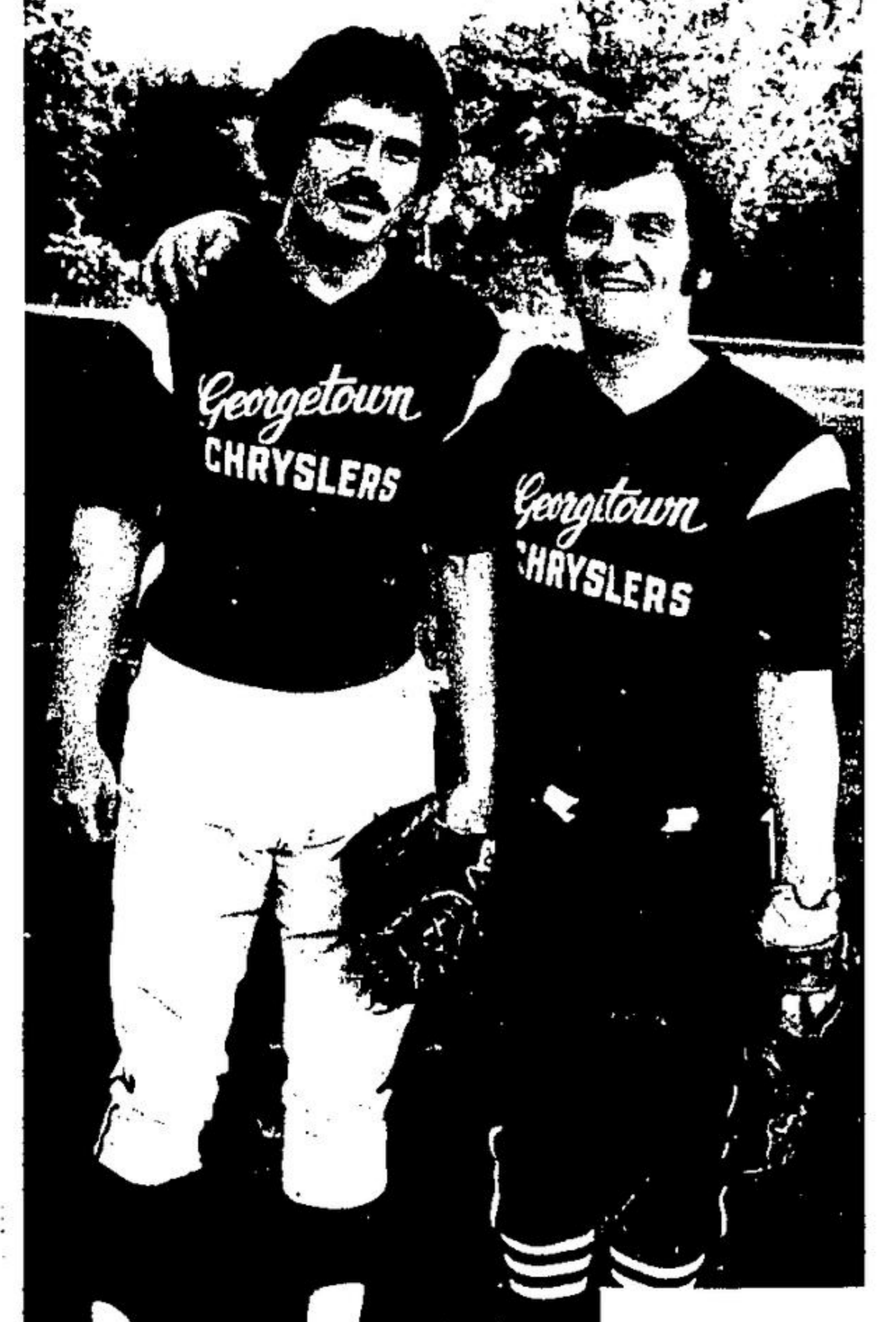
