

Former Lorne Scots C.O. dies suddenly at home

Funeral services were held on Monday, July 5 at St. John's United Church, Georgetown for Lt.-Col. Earl F. Lince, C.D., 20 Parkview Boulevard.

His death occurred suddenly at his home on Thursday, July 1. He was fifty-one years of age.

Born in Stratford, September 6, 1924, he later moved to Oshawa, where he received his education at Risdon Road Public School and Oshawa Collegiate and Vocational School.

He was employed in the Engineering Office of General Motors Corporation until he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Navy where he served as a First Class Stoker during the Second World War. In 1945, while in the navy he married the former Doreen Langford of Oshawa. After discharge, he returned and completed his education.

Prior to his move to Georgetown in 1953, he was employed at Duplate Canada Limited in Oshawa. With other co-workers he was transferred to Smith & Stone in Georgetown where a plastics division was formed.

At the time of his death he was General Manager of Emco

Institute and a member of Branch 120 of the Royal Canadian Legion.

He was Past President of the Society Plastics Engineers, Plastics Manufacturing Company Limited in Brampton.

For over twenty-five years he played an active part in the Canadian Militia. He joined the Ontario Regiment at Oshawa, in 1950, as a Trooper and was commissioned while there. In 1953 he moved to Georgetown and joined the Lorne Scots as a lieutenant, and for eight years he was the Company Commander of "C" Company in Georgetown. One year later he was transferred to the Regimental Headquarters in Brampton as the Training Officer of the Regiment. While serving in this capacity he was awarded the Centennial Medal in recognition of valuable service to his country.

On June 23, 1968 he became Commanding Officer of the Lorne Scots Regiment (P.D. & H.) retiring on May 30, 1971.

At the time of his death he was Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Infantry Association, Secretary-

Treasurer of Lorne Scots Association, member of the Royal Canadian Military and a member of the Society Plastics Industries. He was also a member of the Brampton Industrial Association.

He is survived by his wife Doreen Langford, children Jacqueline (Mrs. David MacFarlane) of Georgetown, Patricia (Mrs. Ian Bowell) of Aurora, Catherine (Mrs. Roger Farwell) of Waterloo, Earl and David at home. Grandchildren: Laura and Michael Bowell, Tricia and Susan MacFarlane and a sister, Mrs. Geraldine Bowler of Oshawa.

The funeral service was conducted by The Rev. H. Llewellyn and The Rev. H. Martin. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Area businessman, Robert Caldwell dies

A well-known former business man and standard-bred horseman Robert John (Bob) Caldwell died suddenly at his farm home June 22.

Mr. Caldwell was known in the community where he operated various business enterprises for over half a century.

Born in 1905 on a farm in the Cheltenham district, he farmed for a few years before joining the A&P stores in Brampton and then later operated a grocery store and restaurants on Main Street, Georgetown.

Twenty-five years ago he built an IGA Supermarket on Guelph Street and only recently sold it.

Always interested in standard-bred racing, Mr. Caldwell acquired a number of horses and five years ago moved to his farm home on the Eighth Line north of Georgetown, where he and his son Edgar operated Caldwell Stables.

Although not in the best of health, he worked out horses on his own track every day, even on the morning of his death.

Bob Caldwell had many friends. He had a philosophy of life that drew young and old alike to hear his thoughts on everyday living. He always had good advice for younger people around him, and felt everyone could succeed in life with hard work and respon-

sibility. He predicted Georgetown would grow to the east when Normandy Boulevard was the last street in that direction. When he built his IGA "why build way out there, Bob? The town will never reach this far"

In 1936, he married Gladys Ireland of Ingwood, who survives with one son, Edgar and three grandchildren: Robert, Cindy and Glenn Caldwell.

He also leaves two brothers and two sisters: Stella (Mrs. Alex McLaren) of Caledon; George of Cheltenham; Helen (Mrs. Phil Levesque) of Oshawa; and Elgin, of Caledon.

Funeral services were held from McClure-Jones Funeral Home with burial in Boston Mills Cemetery. Rev. Francis Cook of Cheltenham United Church conducted the service.

Aged 56, Blick died June 20. He suffered from heart trouble.

Born to George and Ellen Blick of Georgetown in 1920, he moved to Glen Williams at the age of 2. He attended public school in the Glen, high school in Georgetown, then enlisted in the Lorne Scots Militia.

In 1941, he went into active service with the regiment. Then he was posted with the 6th Duke of York, Royal Canadian Hussars, and saw action in Italy, Germany and Holland serving with the 5th Division. Blick received a letter

of commendation for bravery signed by Field Marshall Sir Bernard L. Montgomery. He was also mention in dispatches.
