Chryslers win two, whip both Lowville and Glen

The Georgetown Chryslers, of the Halton County Men's softball League, pulled within one game of the 500 mark for the first time this year last week as they chalked up two wins, both in convincing fashion - a 7-0 whipping of Glen Williams in Georgetown on Friday night and a 5-1 besting of Lowville, in Lowville on Sunday evening.

The twin victories raised the Chryslers record to five wins and six losses, but of perhaps more importance, it should raise the Chryslers morale, which has been flagging of late.

Bill Tilt tossed both wins and if a key man could be chosen in the wins, it would have to be the redheaded hurler. Over 18 innings, Tilt allowed only 14 hits, while fanning 21 batters. Tilt was no slouch at the plate either as he struck four hits in eight official at bats.

On Friday night, although the Chryslers definitely did deserve the win, Glen Williams did little to aid their own cause. The Glen managed six hits and committed four errors. The miscues, it might be added, occurred at crucial times in both the fourth and seventh innings.

The Chryslers added four insurance runs in their half of the seventh, but again, Chryslers power, combined with Glen errors, created the opening.

Bill Tilt, Dave Clark, Gord Tomalty and Ray Ingles all rapped singles but two Glen errors opened the floodgates. Bob McGowan was charged with the loss, he worked seven innings, while Mike Pierce threw the last two frames.

Ray Ingles was the top man with the lumber for the Chryslers, he hit three for four, including, two RBI's; Gord Tomalty was three for five, while Bill Tilt hit two for four. Bob McGowan led the Glen hitting parade, going three for three.

Against Lowville on Sunday night, the main man was, once again, Bill Tilt. Tilt limited powerful first place Lowville to eight hits and chalked up 10 strikeouts. He fanned five would-be hitters in a row through the fourth and fifth innings and struck out two of the three Lowville hitters he faced in the crucial ninth inning. In addition, Tilt did not yield a walk.

The Chryslers went ahead 2-0 in the top of the fourth, when Harry Cuthbert opened the inning with a single and scored on Bob Marchand's double. Bill Tilt then drove Marchand home with a timely single.

In the seventh inning, Georgetown picked up what proved to be an insurance run on a singular outstanding effort. Dave Clark singled, stole second and third and waited home on Grant Usher's sacrifice fly. Two more Georgetown runs were hustled across the plate in the eighth inning, but by that time, the issue had been decided. Lowville scored their lone run in the sixth inning.

Lee Coulson was charged with the Lowville loss, he gave up 11 Chrysler hits but did record 10 strikeouts.

Four Georgetowners provided most of the hometown power. Barry Cuthbert, Bob Marchand, Bill Tilt and Dave Clark, each hit two for four. Ray Ingles hammered out a triple in four at bats.

The Chryslers took part in the Orangeville tournament over the weekend, unfortunately, theirs was a rather brief and inauspicious outing as they were knocked out of the tourney in the first game with a 3-1 loss to Hillsburgh. Quite a few of the regulars were unable to make the trip, so it was not a full Chrysler roster that took to the field.

This Friday, the Chryslers journey to Palermo, while next Monday, game time 8:30 p.m. at the Georgetown Ball Park, they host Hamilton. On Tuesday, the Chryslers are scheduled to play in Burlington.

Rams hit top--bottom

The Acton Rams hit the heights but then plummeted to the depths in OLA Junior "C" last week.

The Rams hosted third place Mississauga Medics Thursday and left the floor with a satisfying 16-14 win.

Single goals were scored by Bill Mathieson, John Vanort and Dave Manery. Doug Taylor and John DeCoursey shared goaltending chores, with DeCoursey picking up three assists.

The Rams were favoured against Orillia on Friday, but again, the underdog triumphed. The Rams were playing with a depleted bench and just didn't have the firepower.

Orillia led 6-4 after two periods then exploded for 10 goals in the final 20 minutes - to only three Ram replies - to put the finishing touch on the 16-7 win.

John DeCoursey and Doug Taylor once again shared duty between the pipes, while Ram goal scorers included; Jim Chilsholm, with a hatrick; Wayne Young, who potted a pair and Kevin Marcoux and Bill Mathieson, who each scored single markers.

This Thursday the Rams host Huntsville Hawks, game time 8:30 p.m. at the Acton Arena, while this Sunday, the locals will make a return trip to Huntsville.
