Storm sewers for Marywood Meadows

Council last week agreed to a development agreement with Sharmount Investments Ltd. for the installation of a storm sewer for 14 lots scheduled for development adjacent to Marywood Meadows.

The agreement came during debate on the authorizing bylaw and several members of council voiced concern over the problems voiced with Elton Developments which is building the Marywood Meadows subdivision.

"We are dealing with two different companies," Coun. Roy Booth told council, "and until there is a problem in existence in the subdivision...we cannot use Elton as a means to delay or stall this one."

Debate centred on efforts by Coun. Ern Hyde to delay authorization of the bylaw agreement "until we are completely satisfied" about the concerns expressed by the people in the Marywood Meadows subdivision.

Approval was granted following a recorded 65 vote with Couns. Morrow, Hyde,

Sykes, Maltby and Howitt voting against the proposal.

"I think the developmental agreement (for the building of the lots) is some time off in the future," Coun. Ern Hyde said.

"Right now I don't disagree they have met their

requirement we have asked for, but I don't believe we have an engineering report."

"I am in favor of those 14 lots being allowed to go in because its the logical time, but I am not in favor of giving approval when we asked the engineer for a report," he said.

"If they stretch construction over four or five years it will cause problems," he added.

Residents of the subdivision have complained to council about installation of lights, paved driveways, topsoil, dust and general construction.

Local thefts, vandalism

Halton Regional Police are investigating the disappearance of \$400 in cash taken July 9 from a Delrex Boulevard residence.

The break and enter through an unlocked rear door is one of three such incidents which occurred in the past week.

The other break and enters occurred at a 10th Line residence July 9 where nothing was reported missing, and at Holy Cross School the following day where paint was spread over the hallway floors.

Damage at the school is estimated at \$200, police said.

Entry was made by breaking a window on the north side of the building.

The plate glass window at the front of Graham Bell Associates in Georgetown was kicked in July 7. Police are still continuing their investigation.

Rezoning for plaza

Approval was granted last week for the amendment to the former Georgetown official plan paving the way for the development of a plaza adjacent to the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena.

Council last week in a recorded vote, with Couns. Ern

Hyde and Harry Levy opposed, approved the amendment which zones the property commercial from industrial.

The commercial rezoning was the product of a year-long Guelph Street commercial planning study carried out by the town.

The bylaw approving the zoning will be forwarded for approval to the Ontario Municipal Board. One objection has been received from Loblaw's which has a store in the Guelph Street plaza opposite the proposed development.

Entry was made through a loading door which was jammed with rocks permitting the door to close but not lock.

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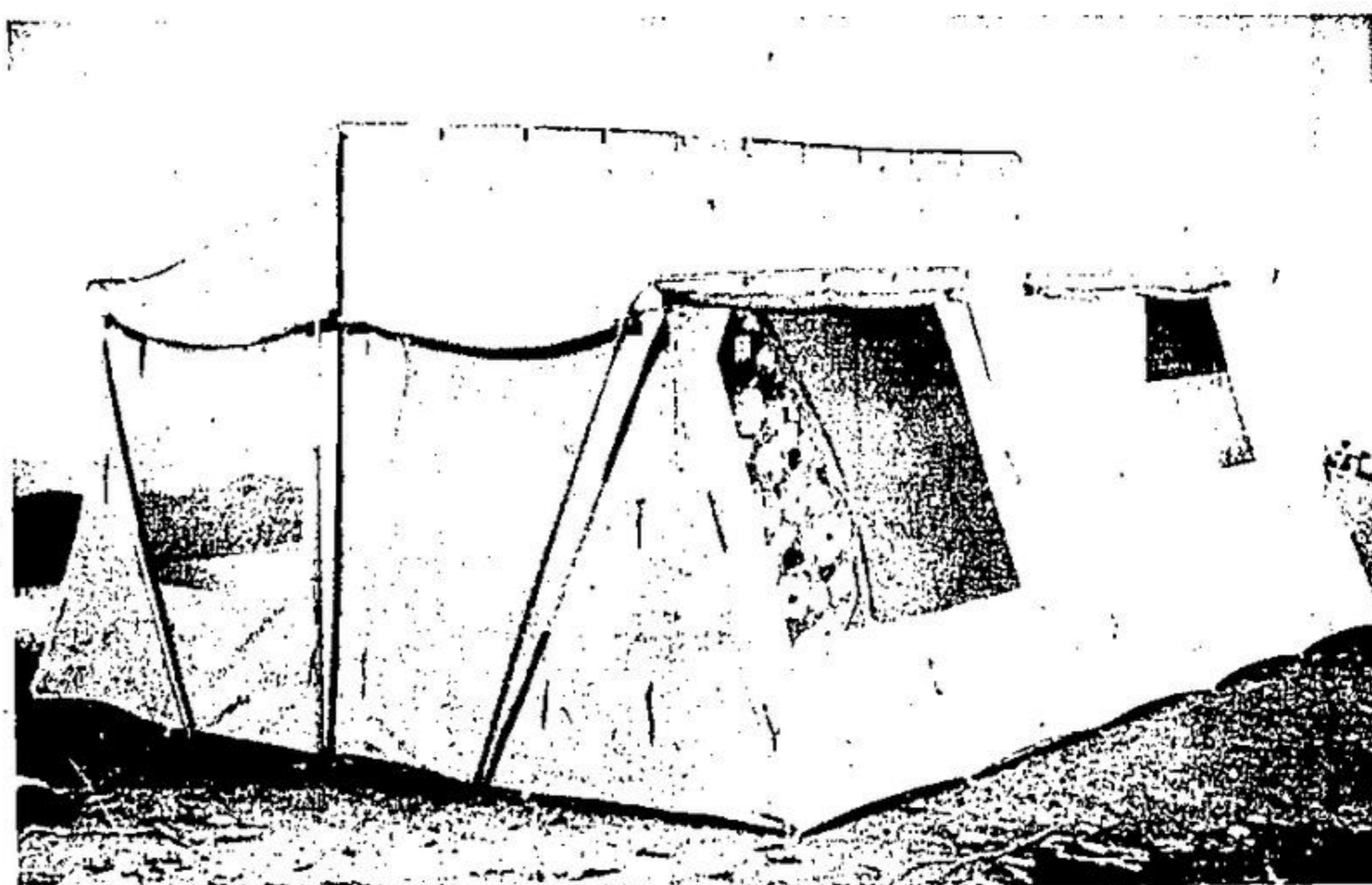
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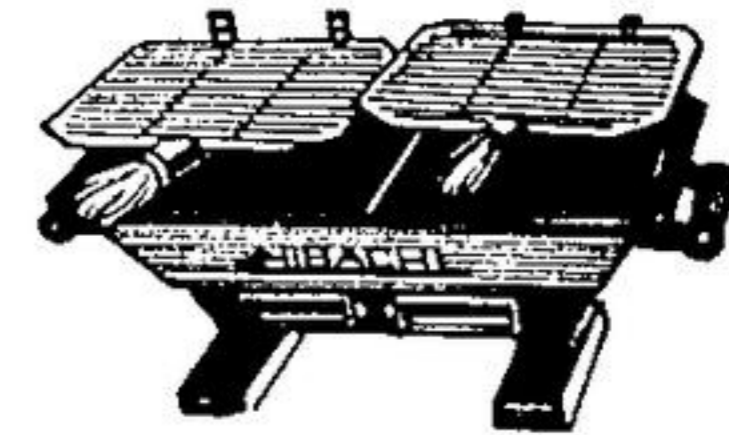
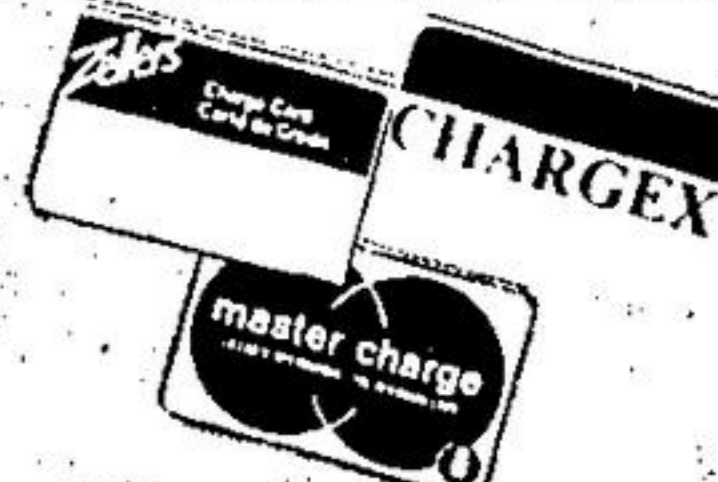
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
