



Motorist freed by firefighters in crash on Highway 7

A motorist was trapped for "20 to 30 minutes" in her wrecked auto before Halton police and Halton Hills fire fighters were able to cut her free, police said.

Patricia Pritchard, 22, of Toronto, was taken after the July 17 accident to Georgetown and District Memorial hospital where her condition at press time was listed as "satisfactory".

Although at the scene of the accident, Highway 7 and Halton Road 3 police believed she was suffering from fractured arms and legs, the hospital spokesman said there were no fractures, nor is Pritchard in the intensive care ward.

"It's not yet determined if there are internal injuries," the spokesman said.

Pritchard, driving a car owned by Keith James Halladay of Etobicoke, was in collision with a car driven by Terry Harlow, 123 C8, Esqueping Township. His injuries were minor, police say.

Pritchard was taken out from the smashed left side of her car, police said, where she was pinned between the door and the steering wheel.

LEFT SIDE SMASHED
The complete left side of Pritchard's vehicle and the complete front end of Harlow's vehicle were smashed, police say. Damage is estimated at \$1,500 to each vehicle.

Police have three witnesses to the accident.

Anne Marie Nielsen suffered minor injuries July 12 and took herself to the doctor after an accident on Trafalgar Road, just north of her home at Concession 7 RR2, Georgetown, police said.

Her car was in collision with one driven by Fred Aldough of Brampton.

Damage is estimated at \$300 for Nielsen's vehicle and \$100 to Aldough's.

An Erin Township driver, Marilyn Eagles, RR3, Orton, suffered minor injuries when in collision with a car driven by George Lane, RR1,

Georgetown in the Back Street Municipal parking lot, July 14. Damage is estimated at \$700 to Lane's vehicle and \$300 to Eagles'.

PLAZA CRASH
Damages to the door of Mac's Milk in Moore Park Plaza and to a Brampton Daily Times newspaper box totalled \$100 in a single car mishap July 12, police said.

The car driven by Christine West, 33 Hewson Cres., Georgetown, sustained \$100 in damages, police say.

A hit and run driver caused \$150 in estimated damages to Brampton driver, Beverly G. Stone's car which was parked in the IGA parking lot on Guelph Street, July 18, police said.

Mable Agnes Senior, 52 Haylawn Cres., was the victim of a hit and run driver who caused \$40 in estimated damages to her car parked at Georgetown Market Place, July 12.

The Georgetown Market Place parking lot was the scene of an accident July 13 when a car driven by Christine Galbraith, 11 Reagan Dr., was in collision with one driven by Mary O'Hagan's 15 Fagan Dr.

Estimated damages were \$250 to O'Hagan's vehicle and \$100 to Galbraith's.

Estimated damages were \$100 to Kirchmayr's vehicle and \$200 to McLaren's.

DeOliviera's vehicle escaped undamaged, police said. Swinkels vehicle had an estimated \$120 in damages.

In the municipal parking lot in Georgetown, July 13, a car driven by Ellis G. Hounsell, 108 Sinclair Ave., was in collision with a car owned by William Carhart, RR2, Georgetown, police say.

Carhart's damages were estimated at \$25. No damages were reported for Hounsell's vehicle.

The town line north of Guelph Street was the scene of an accident July 16 when a car driven by John D. Codlin, RR4, Georgetown, was in collision with a car driven by George Edward Quinn of Port Credit.

Estimated damages were \$250 to Codlin's vehicle and \$100 to Quinn's.

No accidents were reported in the week for Acton.
