Last fall the Liberal Opposition had urged the government to establish a provincial anti-inflation board to deal with the public sector in Ontario.

However, the New Democratic Party did not support this proposal and therefore provincial and municipal workers were placed under the control of the federal board. Now the Supreme Court of Canada has that Ontario's arrangement with Ottawa, passed by cabinet order-incouncil was illegal.


