ONTARIO OUTDOORS Ontario L3T 2A1. McCauley New sign for coaching conservation Georgetown sports buffs

Of importance to all those who venture into the Conservation areas of Ontario, is the new symbol. The sign has a white background with a brown rounded square border. Inside the border is a brown letter "C" and within this letter is a blue wavy symbol which depicts water. Also with the water symbol is the sign for trees, and the whole sign is of reflecting paint.



Has the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources found the summer playground of the COHO SALMON???? It would seem that way as they have come upon huge schools of salmon feeding on the large multitudes of bait fish in Lake Ontario. The boat "SALMO SALAR" has been searching the lake for the last few years and along with the concentrated efforts of the professional fishermen on the lake, such as Ron Penfound of St. Catherines, there have been hundreds of hours put on the lake in that search. I have spent a great many hours with Ron in that search, and can tell-you of the frutiless hours, before the sudden excitement of finding the fish. However the travel pattern of the fish has not been discovered up to this date.

The Ministry headed out on July 18 due south of Tornot Island, and when they reached 320 feet of water, the Salmon started to show up. These fish were at the 25 foot level in 54 degrees temperature, which is the preferred zone for Coho. It is felt that they are on their way into the Credit river are for the fall migration upriver to spawn and die.

If the travel route can be plotted, then a fishery as good as, or better than that in Lake Michigan can be had right here in Lake Ontario.

To hunting: If Mayor Tom Hill knew of what he spoke, he would not be so apt to speak up on the matter of funting deer. In regards to hunting deer with a long bow and proagneed arrows, the hunter needs to get very close before loosing his arrow. The three, four or six bladed arrow has more killing power than most of the bullets that are used for deer. As for the area being too densely populated for hunting. I have been hunting Halton more years than I care to think about, and most of the time you never see anyone. With care and the right gun there is no danger of a long distance shot bitting anyone or anything.

As for Roy Booth: The bow does have the shocking power and more so that a bullet. Chairman Alan Masson: deer are in their own environment and the "odds" are

more than in their favour. Bruce Buckland, wildlife management officer, wants to hear what the hunter has to say. Why don't they ask the hunters'???

Personally, I would like to see an open season or. deer with Shotguns, and SLUGS only. The slug is as big around (almost) as the barrel of the shotgun, and has instant killing power.

What about the other hunters in Halton, let me know your feelings as some already have. After all it is our
