The GREAT salmon hunt is on!

The second annual, "Great Salmon Hunt" is on. The baptismal event was staged last year - the winner was Dick Joyce of Tara, Ontario - and this year's event could prove even more popular.

Over \$16,000 in prize money is up for grabs, the first prize is worth over \$12,000, and it is expected that this should attract anglers from all over Ontario as well as some from the U.S. Great Lake States.

A contest zone on Lake Ontario from Toronto to Hamilton has been chosen to give as many anglers as possible a chance to participate with as little travelling as possible. Fishing is allowed from boats, riverbanks, docks, or whatever is permitted, in the area covered by the contest.

A handicap system has been worked out, so that the winning fish might be either a coho or chinook salmon. If a fisherman wishes to enter a coho salmon, its weight will be multiplied by 1.72, which has been determined as the normal difference in weight between adults of the two species.

Net proceeds of the "Great Salmon Hunt" will be used for conservation purposes.

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Royalettes in Provincials

Royalettes lose but bounce back to even Ontario series

There is an old sports saying, "When the going gets tough, the tough get going," and it could very easily be applied to the Georgetown Legion Royalettes. The Royalettes embarked on their quest for a provincial Juvenile "A" title last week against Alderwood and split the first two games in the best three of five opening round series. The third game in the series was scheduled for Georgetown, Tuesday evening, unfortunately, at press time the score was not available.

The Royalettes were routed at home last Tuesday (July 27) by a 12-1 count but then rebounded and humiliated Alderwood, 13-1 in Alderwood last Wednesday.

An old baseball - and softball - adage suggests that you take one game at a time and had the Georgetowners heeded this well worn advice on Tuesday, they just might have given a better account of themselves. The locals were on top 2-1 after four innings of play, then the proverbial roof caved in. In the

top of the fifth inning, Alderwood poured nine runs across the plate, on seven recorded Royalette errors and several mental miscues and that as the saying goes, was the ball game.

The Alderwood deluge took the starch out of the Legion lassies and they were never a factor in the game from that point on. Alderwood added insult to injury by scoring twice more in their half of the seventh to make the final score 12-2 but the game could have been called after five.

Royalette regular, Patti Caruso, summed up the stunning opening game result this way, "We had beaten Alderwood twice during the regular season and I guess we didn't take the game seriously enough. Also, it didn't really feel like the start of provincial playdowns, why, I don't know, and we weren't mentally ready."

Alderwood regardless of earlier results, are not a team to be taken lightly as they are the defending champions in the

Peel-County Juvenile division and also, the 1975 Juvenile "B" All-Ontario champions.

Laura Wilkes, with spot relief from Betty Marchment, was charged with the Tuesday loss, while Brenda Smith and Patti Caruso scored the two Royalette runs.

In Alderwood on Wednesday, it was obvious that the Georgetown nine had revised their thinking and their approach to the series. Pre-game drills were done crisply and with a vengeance and it appeared that the Royalettes were out for blood.

The bloodletting began early as the Royalettes scored twice in their half of the first inning, pushed across six runs in the third, romped for four more runs in the fourth and ended the lopsided win by scoring a single run in the fifth inning. Alderwood managed their lone run in the fourth inning.

Laura Wilkes was back in top form on the mound for Georgetown as she allowed the single run on five hits while chalking up six strikeouts.

Janet McKay had her bat singing as she went four-for-four, and scored three runs; Patti Caruso and Betty Marchment each hit three-for-four, while Charlene Milton was three-for-five. Betty Marchment also crossed the plate three times.

Regardless of the outcome of Tuesday night's game, according to Coach, Ted Wilkes, the Royalettes will be playing at home this week, although dates and times have not yet been set.

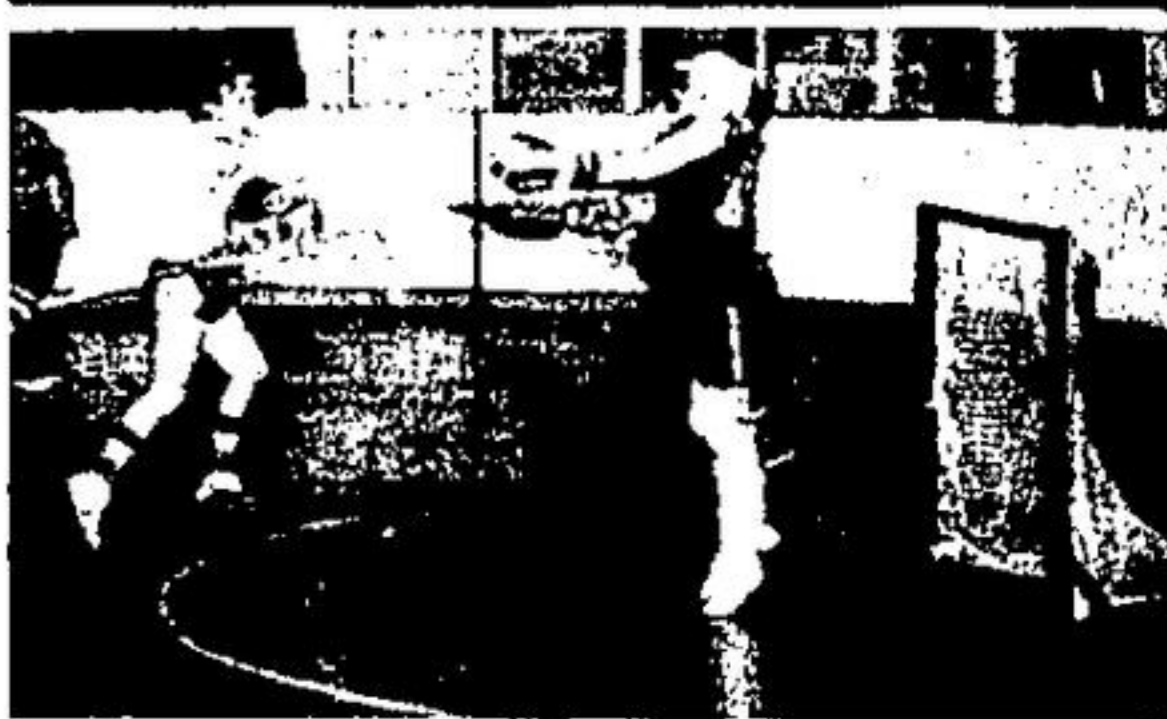

Wintario grants totalling \$68,341 have been approved for 11 projects in Halton Region.

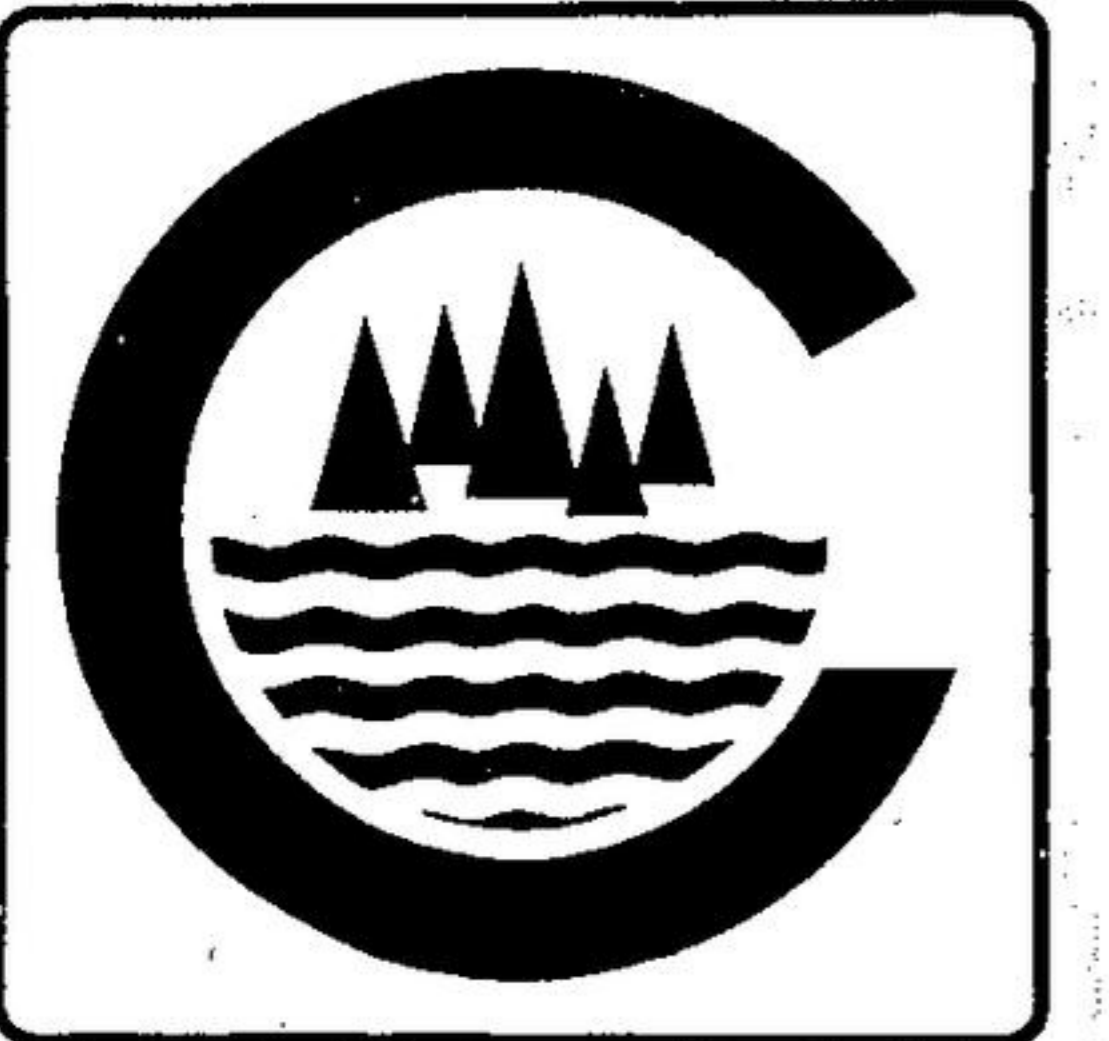
The amounts range from \$25,000 to \$250 and three Halton Hills sports groups have been chosen as recipients of some of awards.

The Georgetown Lion's Club has been approved as eligible to receive a grant up to \$25,000 for renovations including work to change rooms, showers and washrooms at the club's pool.

The Glen Williams Minor Softball Association will receive \$544 to purchase softball equipment, while the Acton Minor Baseball Association will purchase equipment with a \$982 Wintario grant.

ONTARIO OUTDOORS New sign for conservation

Of importance to all those who venture into the Conservation areas of Ontario, is the new symbol. The sign has a white background with a brown rounded square border. Inside the border is a brown letter "C" and within this letter is a blue wavy symbol which depicts water. Also with the water symbol is the sign for trees, and the whole sign is of reflecting paint.



Has the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources found the summer playground of the COHO SALMON???? It would seem that way as they have come upon huge schools of salmon feeding on the large multitudes of bait fish in Lake Ontario. The boat "SALMO SALAR" has been searching the lake for the last few years and along with the concentrated efforts of the professional fishermen on the lake, such as Ron Penfound of St. Catharines, there have been hundreds of hours put on the lake in that search. I have spent a great many hours with Ron in that search, and can tell you of the fruitless hours, before the sudden excitement of finding the fish. However the travel pattern of the fish has not been discovered up to this date.

The Ministry headed out on July 18 due south of Toronto Island, and when they reached 320 feet of water, the Salmon started to show up. These fish were at the 25 foot level in 54 degrees temperature, which is the preferred zone for Coho. It is felt that they are on their way into the Credit river are for the fall migration upriver to spawn and die.

If the travel route can be plotted, then a fishery as good as, or better than that in Lake Michigan can be had right here in Lake Ontario.

To hunting: If Mayor Tom Hill knew of what he spoke, he would not be so apt to speak up on the matter of hunting deer. In regards to hunting deer with a long bow and broadhead arrows, the hunter needs to get very close before loosing his arrow. The three, four or six bladed arrow has more killing power than most of the bullets that are used for deer. As for the area being too densely populated for hunting, I have been hunting Halton more years than I care to think about, and most of the time you never see anyone. With care and the right gun there is no danger of a long distance shot hitting anyone or anything.

As for Roy Booth: The bow does have the shocking power and more so that a bullet. Chairman Alan Masson: deer are in their own environment and the "odds" are more than in their favour.

Bruce Buckland, wildlife management officer, wants to hear what the hunter has to say. Why don't they ask the hunters???

Personally, I would like to see an open season on deer with shotguns, and SLUGS only. The slug is as big around (almost) as the barrel of the shotgun, and has instant killing power.

What about the other hunters in Halton, let me know your feelings as some already have. After all it is our ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
