Acton man lost in New Hampshire

A 75-year-old Acton man, Charles Pifko of 150 Wynford Pl. has been reported missing at a New Hampshire state park since Friday, the Herald

learned at press time.

Pifko was accompanied by his wife, daughter and son-in-law, said the report.

The search for Pifko continues at the 750-acre park in White Mountains about 80 miles from the Canadian border.

McMullen's condition improves to critical

The condition of James McMullen, 9, of Acton, who was injured in a traffic accident last Monday has improved from "critical" to "serious" a spokesman for the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto said this week.

McMullen, a pedestrian was struck by a car trying to avoid a dog on the road. He is still in the intensive care ward, the spokesman said.

Following the mishap on the town line about one quarter of a mile east of the Erin-Eramosa Line, McMullen and his companion, Michael Edward Raynor, 9, were taken to Guelph General Hospital. McMullen, suffering head injuries and lacerations was later transferred to the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto.

Hydro accepts bid

Acton Hydro Electric Commission picked a middle bid by Acton Auto Body last week for repairs to the commission's 1968 truck.

In selecting the \$960 bid, the commission noted it was the

only one that specified the use of new metal to refill rust damage in the door panels, inner fenders and other locations. The bid from Hogan Auto Body was \$940, another from Halton Hills Collision was \$1,345.

Jewelry heist, car break ins in Acton crime week

Thieves stole jewelry valued at \$2,700 from a Kingham Road home after forcing entry through a basement screen window, Aug. 13, police said.

One lady's platinum, diamond ring valued at \$2,000, gold cuff links at \$200, a pair of gold car rings, girl's gold ring and man's gold watch band

valued at \$50 each and a \$25 gold tie clip were taken from the jewelry box, police said. A mini calculator valued at \$100 also was stolen.

None of the articles had identifying marks on it. Police are investigating. Thieves broke into four

parked vehicles on Aug. 10, police said.

From the locked vehicle parked at the rear of a Churchill Road residence, thieves made away with an Sibebrand AM, CB, radio, a linear amplifier, a desk microphone and a transistor

radio. An Emare "Western Type" tan and black saddle was stolen from a vehicle in a Church Street parking lot, police said.

From a Churchill Road South parking lot thieves stole a tool box and an extension

light, police said.

An eight-track tape recorder was stolen from a car parked either at the owner's Ransom Street residence or Beardmore Tannery's parking lot, police said.

As well, on Aug. 10, a 14 foot Green Tremblay cedar strip

canoe was stolen from the shores of Fairy Lake, police said.

Thieves stole a 20 inch rear wheel and left the rest of the bicycle locked to the bicycle stand outside a Churchill Road S. apartment building, Aug. 11, police said.

Council approves bylaw lifts controls on nine lots

Council approved a bylaw Monday for the lifting of part lot control on nine lots in a development on Old Lane, Acton, despite some council members being confused over the intent of the bylaw.

Coun. Ric Morrow told clerk-administrator Doug Pritchard he didn't understand the explanation for council approving the bylaw without a report from the planner. Mr. Pritchard had explained

that bylaw allowed for the proposal to develop semi-detached homes on the nine lots through severances from the regional land division committee and all agreements between the town and the developer, Old Lane Estates, of Toronto, had been met.

The proposal has been 2 1/2 years in the works, he said, and final approval of the bylaw rests with the minister of housing before building permits can be issued.

The bylaw also stipulates that the nine lots will be split down the centre dividing wall of the structures and that Halton Hills will not object if the frontage resulting from the severances does not conform completely to the zoning bylaw.

Defective steering motorcyclist injured

Defective steering on a motorcycle driven by David A. Duncliffe, L16 C5, caused him to lose control and fall off his vehicle on Highway 7 east of Third Line Aug. 10, police said.

Suffering multiple abrasions, Duncliffe was kept overnight for observation at the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital and released the next day.

Estimated damages to his motorcycle were \$60. Randy Upton, 109 Crescent St., sustained \$1,000 in damages to his vehicle Aug. 9

after he swerved on the Sixth Line, three-tenths of a mile south of Hwy. 7, to avoid hitting a dog and slid into the ditch, police said.

Mill Street, east of Wilbur Street was the scene of an accident Aug. 12 when a car driven by Peter Albert Schupp, L23 C1 was in collision with one driven by Beverley Carol Appleyard, L22 C6, Nassagaweya, police said. Estimated damages were \$700 to Schupp's vehicle and \$100 to Appleyard's.

New trial for Baron

A new trial for Manfred Baron and Rywa Regina Wertman, who were sentenced a year ago to 14 years in prison for conspiring to murder Wertman's husband, was ordered by the Supreme Court of Ontario on appeal, Monday.

In a 53 page reserved judgment, Mr. Justice John Arup, Lloyd Moulden and Arthur Martin ruled that misdirection to the jury by Supreme Court Justice Edson Hines as well as errors on several points of law may have affected the verdict.

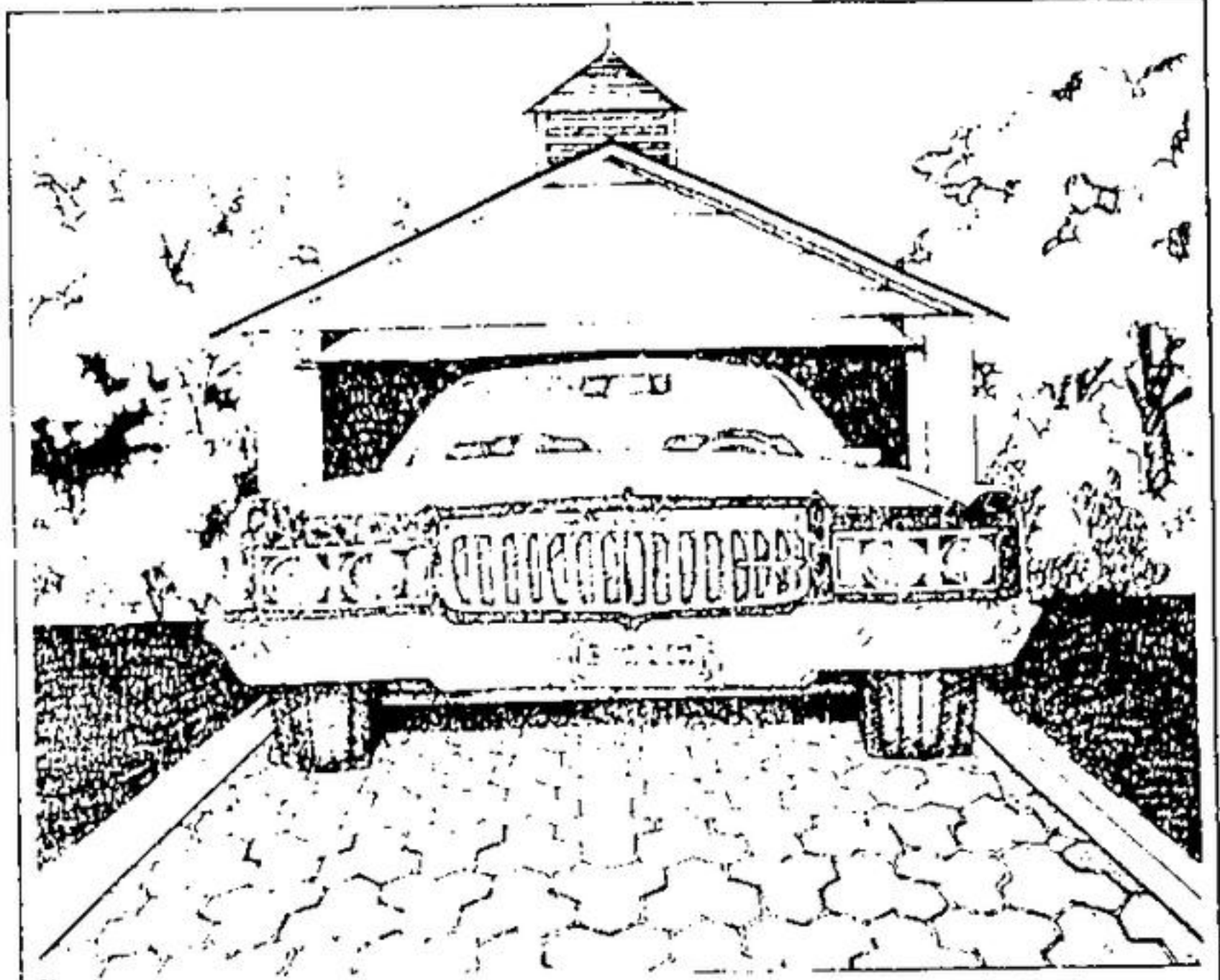

BUSINESS MEN IN THE NEWS



Basil Kutter, better known as the Baz of Baz Motors, says he wasn't born in the automotive business but grew up in it and after time as a mechanic and a salesman, five years ago he put his own name on the Volkswagen, Honda dealership in Georgetown.

His dealership is built on a simple triangle, the base of which is service. "For us, service is the name of the game," Baz says, "and the sales will follow automatically."

At the core of service is the mechanic and a minimum of three times a year each mechanic attends factory sponsored training to keep them "up-to-date," Baz says. Fully trained mechanics then draw from a spare parts stockroom with more than 6,000 items. They use a \$6,500 diagnostic machine to pinpoint a car's problem and a \$3,000 machine Baz calls an "infra-red, hydrocarbon and carbon monoxide tester, without which "it's impossible to adjust or do a proper tune up on a car."

Sales make up one side of the triangle. "We are selling the best three makes available in today's market," Baz says, "the Volkswagen, the Audi and the fantastically priced Honda." With Jimmy Walsh who has sold Volkswagens for 13 years in Georgetown and Audrey Kelly, who just loves talking to everybody, says Baz, "you can actually call our dealership the place for one stop shopping."

"I also make it a point to meet personally every customer who buys a car from us," Baz says, revealing the third side of the triangle. "Most people appreciate talking to the owner and knowing where they stand." He believes "the only good deal is if the buyer and the seller are happy."

As the sponsor of the Baz Motor Rabbits soccer club and the Baz Motors Bugs hockey team, "I'm very proud of being a member of this outstanding community," he says.

The structure of the triangle is based on pride. "I insist that my employees take pride in their work," Baz says. "Regardless of how long it takes, it's got to be done right the first time."

All makes of cars this fall will rise by five or six per cent in price, Baz says, and he admits he doesn't like this increase. Nevertheless, with a line of cars designed for economy-minded motorists: "I expect business to be really good."
