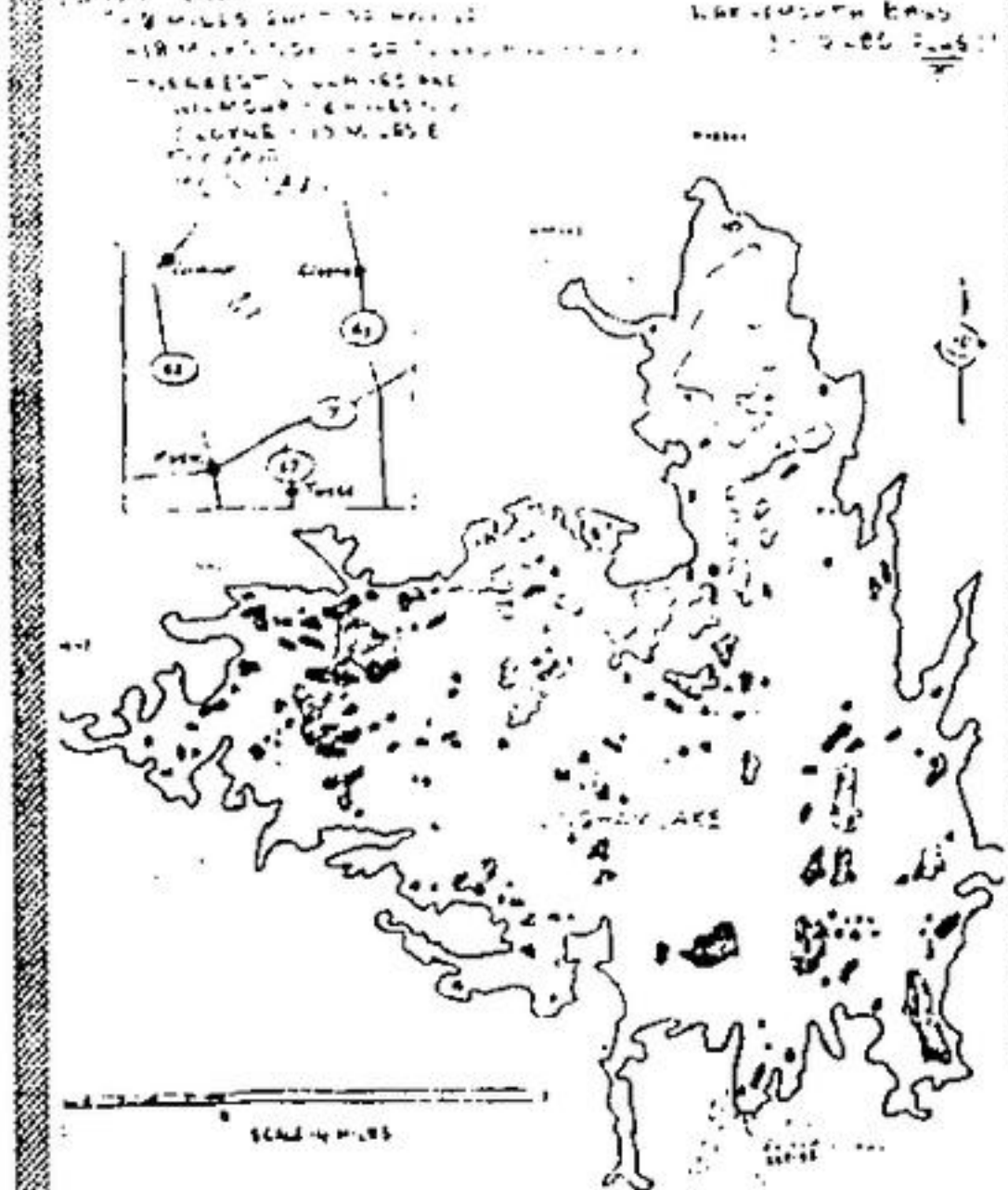

This put the rush on the lake, and there is now a fly in service with a camp, and at least two tractor services, as well as a lodge catering to the fishermen.

The tractor service is just that, a farm tractor with a box wagon in tow. All your gear is loaded in the box along with your poor, unsuspecting body. Dave Hobbs and myself were in last week, and a Scout stripped all the gears on it's 7000 pound wynch trying to pull someone else out.

As for the fishing, it seems that no one has caught anything over 2 pounds this year, with the exception of the occasional 5 pounder. Lingham Lake is still underfished, but no longer a virgin lake. The keen edge has worn off since its creation in 1925 by a dam on the Black River. Royalettes edge Bay nine, advance against Sarnia

The Georgetown Legion Royalettes thrilled over 400 local supporters at the Fairgrounds Park Sunday as they edged Frenchman's Bay, 3-2 to advance to semi-final play in Ontario Provincial Juvenile "A" playdowns.

The Royalettes won the first game in the best of three provincial quarter final, 6-3 in Frenchman's Bay Aug. 8 and the win at home clinched the series for the locals. Coach, Ted Wilkes, used three pitchers in the contest, Laura Wilkes, Barb Curry and Betty Marchmont and he felt that all three played an important role in the win.

Most of the scoring was done in the early innings and after 2 1/2 innings, the score was tied 2-2. The Royalettes opened the scoring by pushing across two runs in the bottom of the second inning. Leanne Gilson led off the

inning with a single and pranced home as the next batter, Patit Curuso, laced a triple down the left field lane. The scoring play could, in a sense, be credited just as easily to a managerial mistake as Patit's triple. Frenchman's Bay had a speed-merchant on the mound and in other games, most batters were swinging late. The infield and outfield shifted to the right when Pattie came to bat and her hit scooted along the vacated left side of the field.

Margo Butler brought Pattie home with a beautiful sacrifice bunt that was almost unplayable. The Royalettes scored what proved to be the winning run in the bottom of the fourth and again, a sacrifice bunt, paved the way. Charlene Milton walked to open the Royalettes plate parade and some heads-up base running allowed her to

move to third. Barb Curry drove a grounder that brought both the third baseman and shortstop in for the attempt and when Charlie noticed that no one was covering the third sack, she scooted for the base. Brenda Smith then stepped into the batters box and her sacrifice bunt allowed Charlene to score. The Royalettes weren't out of the woods yet, as the score would indicate, and it took a splendid defensive play to save off a Frenchman's Bay scoring attempt.

In the top of the fifth, with two out and a runner on second, a low line drive was directed at Royalette centre fielder barb Curry. Barb took the lucky shot on one bounce and zipped the relay to home plate. With the Frenchman's Bay runner, thundering for home, center fielder Margo Butler, calmly fielded the ball and braced herself for the crash. The expected collision occurred, but after the dust had settled, Margo still had the ball and the important out. This was the visitors last serious scoring chance.

The win now moves the Royalettes up against Sarnia, a highly touted provincial contender. The first game in this semifinal best of three series will be played in Sarnia's Tecumseh Park this Saturday, game time 6:30 p.m. The scene will then be shifted to Georgetown's Fairgrounds Park with the second game of the series scheduled for 1:00 p.m. Sunday. Should a third game be necessary, it will be played at the Fairgrounds Park at 5:30 p.m. The Royalettes are hoping that their many supporters will turn out Sunday to wish them well in their All-Ontario Juvenile "A" bid.
