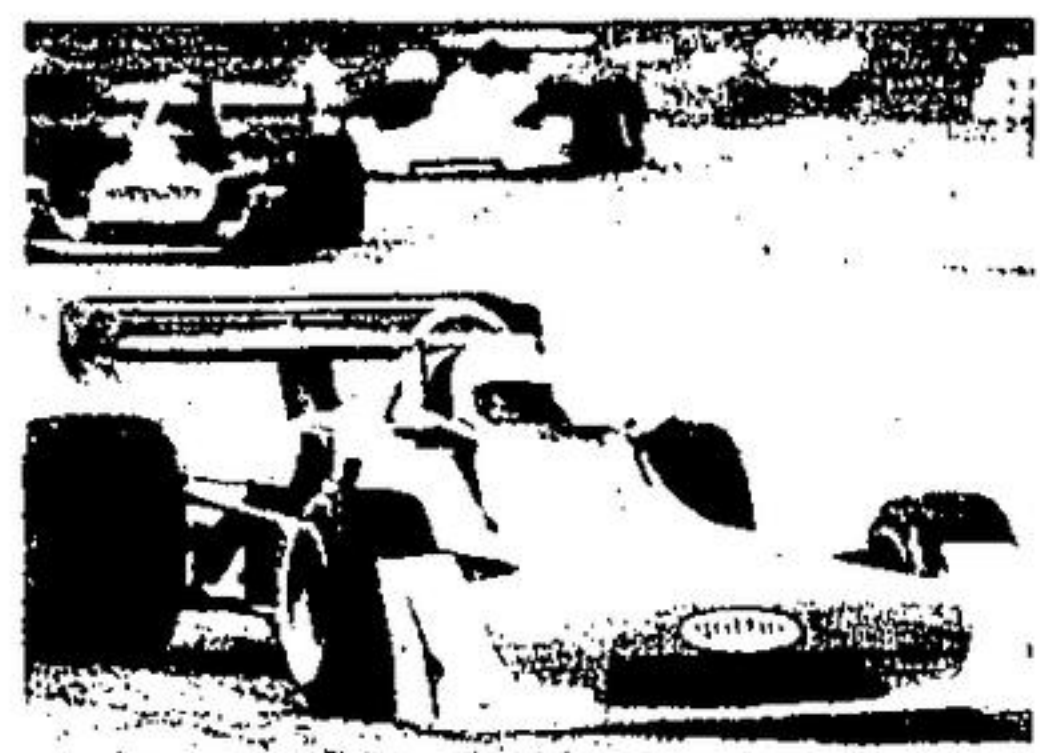

Congratulations must be given to Mr. Service, the able Arsenal Coach, and Grant Speed, Centurion Coach, for the skills shown during this game. Until the last few minutes, the 5-3 Pineview result was always in doubt.

Unfortunately, Arsenal arrived with just nine players. It seems a great pity that this situation must happen so often. Realizing vacation periods do have an upsetting effect on schedules, a system should be devised whereby odd players from other teams could be called upon to fill in occasionally, especially in this age of soccer.

Consequently, parents remark, why is not the rest of the five acre playground grass cut like the soccer field? My stock answer has to be, Sorry Lady its not in the budget. The next question is, but this is listed as a playground, once again, Sorry Lady its not in the budget.

What we need is a Recreation Leader with power, someone with vision, whose job is not on the line when something must be done, who's worry is not the mechanics of a project, but the people its meant to serve. Currently being considered, 105 housing units at Mountain and River Drive, 41 estate homes on the 6th Line, another 100 homes on McLaren land, may I ask, "Has any thought been given to Recreation facilities?" Would some of our councillors take a short trip to Huttonville and see two fine tennis courts, a brand new soccer field, and an outdoor skating rink-cum-lacrosse court, all floodlit and that is for a small community. All our activities are centred around arenas, this is fine providing you are born with a pair of skates.

What about a gymnasium? It could be used for indoor soccer competitions (Winter) and a youth club. Would this not help to keep down our rising crime rate?
