

PROPOSAL PREPARED FOR PRIVATE PARKING PROBLEM

A proposal will be placed before council next month for a negotiated settlement with Deb-Beck Investments for the use of 11 parking meters on private property on James Street.

Details of the agreement were not released at finance committee Monday but it is understood the provisions call for a 31 per cent increase in compensation now paid to the owners of the property to offset taxation.

It is also understood that a recommendation has been made to remove the meters from the property should difficulty arise in negotiating a settlement. Deb-Beck is seeking \$700 a year as compensation.

The committee learned two weeks ago that the property along James Street is on agreements between the town, parking private property. An administrator's report

tabled at committee showed that an easement was allowed of a building on the property to encroach six inches onto municipal services.

Clerk administrator Doug Pritchard also noted that there is a vehicle right-of-way granted for access to the rear of the finance and treasury building on Main Street South.

Last week Coun. Ern Hyde suggested investigation of the circumstances surrounding the granting of the parking area on private property saying when the building was constructed concessions had been granted for the owners.

Finance committee later recommended that clarification and confirmation of all that the property along James Street is on agreements between the town, parking private property. An administrator's report authority and private landowners be made.

Five stolen mailboxes top weekly police report

MP gets violence report

Halton MP Frank Philbrook will receive a copy of a board of education report into violence on television.

Board of education trustees recommended the action Thursday after the member of Parliament sought the board's comments on proposed changes under the Broadcasting Act calling for guidelines for sex and violence.

Board chairman Judy Alexander said the board does not know whether the guidelines are meant to be restrictive or broadened.

The board report released in February showed that 75 per cent of children surveyed showed pleasure in watching violent television programs, and 23.7 per cent indicated they had nothing better to do.

The report was made by a teacher at Pineland public school.

Permits worded carefully

The works committed fussed a little more than usual Monday so as to get the wording of a recommendation to council just right.

Although in its entirety the recommendation sounds much like any other committee produced pronouncement, the careful wording allows some trucks to haul gravel on class B roads in Halton Hills and others not.

The distinction is aimed at preventing gravel trucks, which can weigh in excess of 40,000 pounds, using class B roads regularly as part of a route through Halton Hills. It would permit legitimate deliveries of gravel to local residents by local trucks.

Without a permit allowing overweight trucks on class B roads which have a 22,000 pound limit, vehicles will not be permitted to travel other than on designated roads through the town.

The works committee recommendation to council is that "a permit be issued to firms that are trucking to and from properties fronting on Class B roads."

Woman accosted

A Georgetown woman walking through the Market Place after work Aug. 19 was accosted by two tall, stocky negro males who shouted at her, then ran after her as she tried to flee, police said.

One of the suspects grabbed the woman by the arm but she broke free, police said. The police are on the lookout for the suspects.

Discussed during the four day provincial meeting were salary negotiations, the effect of the Anti-Inflation Board, the size of elementary school classes and the amount of money spent on elementary school operation.

Guest speakers included Florence Henderson, FWTAO executive secretary, Margaret Beckingham, retiring provincial president, Toronto

Star columnist Lotta Dempsey and recently retired chairman of the Ontario Advisory Board on the Status of Women, Laura Sabia.
