Ninety children win 1976 Reading Olympic medals

Ninety Halton Hills children finished the quota of twelve books in the first summer reading program organized by Georgetown and Acton libraries.

Friday, each received a gold medal on a red, white and blue ribbon, in conjunction with the theme "Reading Olympics". Donna Brown of Georgetown was honored for reading the most books in the two month competition period. Donna read 44. Melanie Johnston was honored for being the first to read 12 books in Acton.

Mike Long and Susan Mason of Georgetown tied for first by completing twelve books ahead of the other library club members.

All participants in the 1976 "Reading Olympics" visited their local library during the day to deliver oral book reports. Charts were made to follow each child's progress.

Parent volunteers Mrs. E. Blain, Pat Robinson and Mrs. Schreiber assisted with this special project at Acton library while two summer students, Deborah Ann Phipps

and Lynda Simioni, were hired by Georgetown library to help staff there.

"It was a lot of work, but well worth it," said Wendy Egerton, in charge of Georgetown library's children's department.

She added that this program helped increase summer book circulation to the same level it is when school is in progress.
