This is the third year for the event sponsored by the Mississauga Cycling Club in conjunction with the Mississauga City Festival.





the first left and you're on Victoria Park Drive where you can't miss it.



suffering their most hamiliating loss of the season, 33-10, at the capable hands of the Combined Effort of Acton and Crewsons Corners, last week in Acton.



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
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
