The Hillsburgh Junior Northstars lost a chance to capture the All-Ontario Junior "B" Provincial crown last week, when they dropped two games to Cobourg and thereby lost the best-of-three series in straight games. Cobourg whipped the Hillsburgh girls, 11-4 and 13-1, and Hillsburgh Manager, Mrs. George Wheeler, admitted that her charges were definitely outclassed. "Cobourg had the pitching, the hitting and the defense," she stated, "and overall, were simply the better team."

Public meeting on official plan

Halton Region official plan discussions reach the public beginning next week.

Planning director Ed Cumming last week announced the opening of the second phase in the three-phase development of an overall growth pattern for the region.

A series of informal public meetings will be held in various centres across the region including Georgetown Sept. 23 and Acton, Sept. 15. Mr. Cumming said the information meetings will follow a newspaper advertising campaign designed to draw public comment on how residents see the development of the region.

Comments will be tabulated and regional council starting in November will prepare to present alternative growth patterns to the public for final ratification in 1977.

Among the alternatives will be growth patterns for population and settlement which will provide either for the development of the southern region as an urban corridor, or development of the various existing rural settlements with a concentration on agricultural base in the north.

Initial range of populations developed in previous regional studies show that population of Halton could range from 400,000 to 1,200,000 by the year 2000. The latter figure is "way out in left field", according to planning committee chairman Mary Munro.

"If we have 1.2 million people by 2001, the impact would be tremendous," Mrs. Munro added.

The prime purpose of regional government is land use planning, Mr. Cumming said. He added that the alternatives presented to the public next year may be very restrictive.

All aspects of lifestyle, some of which were never considered in land use planning five or six years ago, must be incorporated into the plan.

These included employment, traffic flows and settlement patterns as well as achieving an ecological balance.

Mrs. Munro said members of the planning committee, which is working with interim planning policies are "impatient" for the regional plan "because we have nothing we can point to that we have as a policy."

First phase of the study was carried out this spring as the goals and objectives of the regional community. Talks with various municipal, special interest and ratepayer groups provided the initial information.

Some of the information areas include housing and economic, but the agricultural and mining resources study must still be completed.

The effect of the Niagara Escarpment planning area on the regional plan is not known. Mrs. Munro feels that a strong local plan may overrule it if presented to the province. She added that had regional government existed in the past there may not have been a need for the formation of the commission.

Mr. Cumming stressed that not a single, but a series of alternative development concepts will be presented to regional and area councils and the public in 1977.

These will be accompanied by descriptions of the "effects to help the public express its preferences."
