She said the project can not become financially supported by any government body after its mandate which runs from November to July over a period of 60 man-weeks is completed.

Ontario's school bus safety regulations are everyone's responsibility.

This is what you can do to make sure they're observed.


Your Ontario Government needs your help in protecting our province's school children. So we urge you as a motorist to drive with extra care whenever you see a

school bus in front of you or coming towards you. You will recognize the school bus by its chrome-yellow colour. And whenever it flashes its alternating red signal lights front and rear, you must stop. In fact, all traffic from both directions must stop.

This is true everywhere in Ontario... on highways, country roads, and city, town or village streets, and regardless of the speed limit. The penalty for disobeying this law is a fine of up to \$100 and 4 demerit points.

The only exception is for motorists going in the opposite direction from the school bus on the other side of a multi-lane highway divided by a physical barrier.

There is something else; " can do, as well. Instruct your children to follow the school bus safety rules learned at school - to help the bus driver by behaving quietly and by keeping seated until it is time to leave the bus.
