

# No LIP grants in North Halton

Barbara Heller, a federal project officer for Halton constituency, says no Local Initiatives Program grant applications have been made for North Halton.

Mrs. Heller, of Acton, project officer for Ontario and Ottawa-Whitby riding as well, said to her knowledge she has been given no reports on applications from Halton Hills, North Milton or the Erin district.

"There have been requests for three or four applications," she said, but those have been in the Oakville area.

Deadline for applications is Sept. 10. Forms which are available from manpower and immigration offices must be submitted to the regional

manpower office in Toronto where a review is instituted. A further review is carried out by a constituency advisory group composed of members appointed by Dr. Frank Philbrook, MP Halton.

Dr. Philbrook, in a telephone conversation Tuesday said the minimum grant of \$75,000 is available for Halton and his constituency advisory group will be meeting shortly after the deadline date to appraise applications.

Among the 14 members appointed to the group are: Rex Heslop of Georgetown, Bob Bonnett, of Acton and Yvonne Christie of Milton.

"SURPRISE"

Dr. Philbrook expressed "surprise" that no applications have been reported in North Halton, especially from municipal sources.

Mr. Heller explained that anyone, individual or municipality may apply for a LIP grant subject to the project "having a demonstrated need now for an expanded or new service in the community."

Last weekend marked the premiere of Corn Cob Capers, Mountsberg Wildlife Centre's fall program.

It runs from Aug. 28 to Sept. 26, Saturdays and Sunday only. Ulrich Waterman delivered a lecture, complimented with a slide show, on the topic of "Birds of Prey" Sunday.

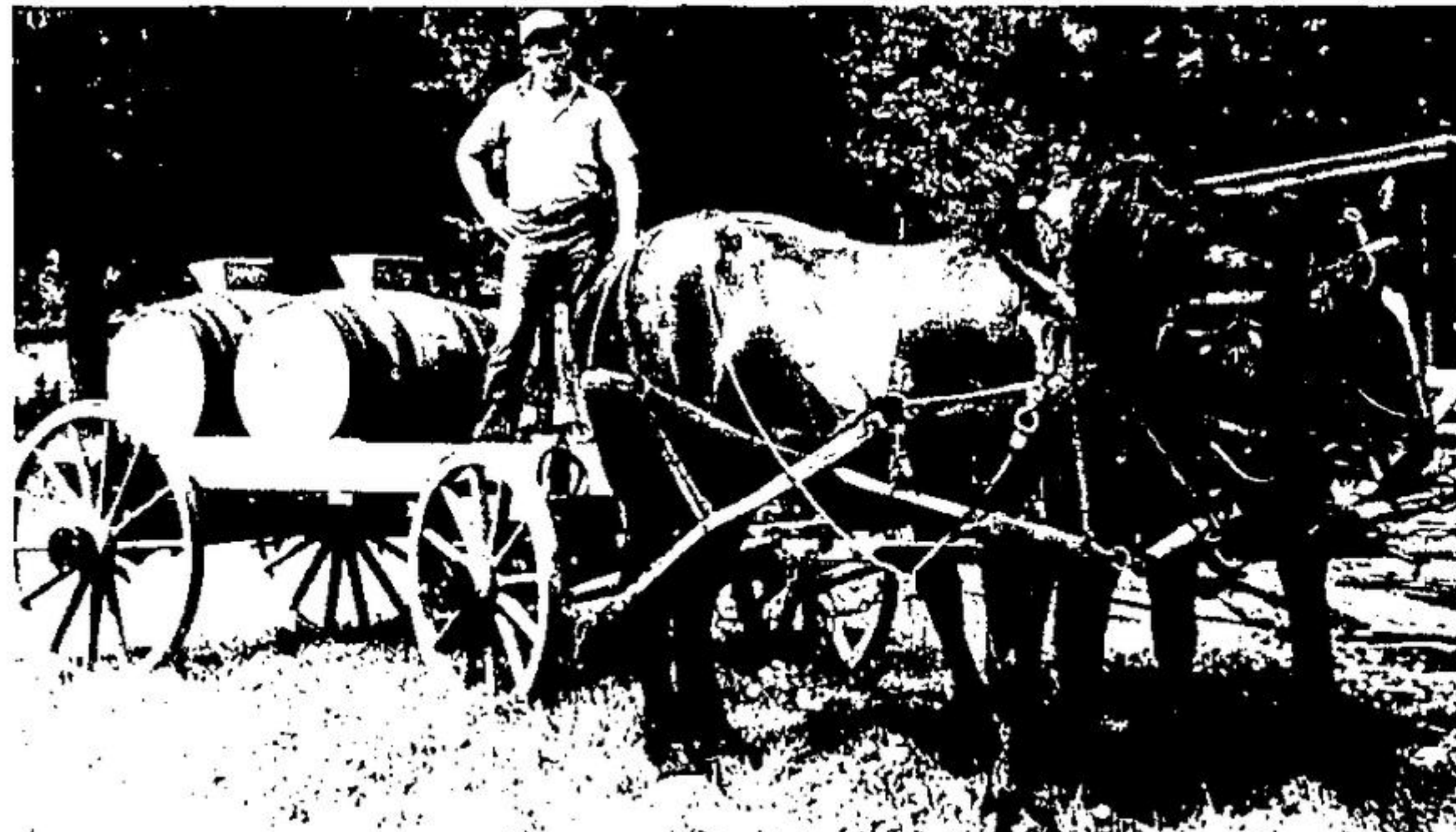
Highlighting next Sunday, are bird banding demonstrations. Since the spring, over 1,000 birds, the majority ducks, have been banded at Mountsberg Wildlife Centre.

LIP is designed to stimulate employment in areas which have peak unemployment during the winter months. Dr. Philbrook says Halton has one of the lowest unemployment rates in Canada and therefore qualifies only for the minimum \$75,000 grant.

"It has to be of community benefit," Mrs. Heller said. "However, it can not become a duplication with, or an extension of, existing community services."

She said the project can not become financially supported by any government body after its mandate which runs from November to July over a period of 60 man-weeks is completed.

Projects must start between Nov. 2 and Jan. 31 1977 and be completed by July 2.

# Region to stop welfare rip offs

Halton Region chief administration officer Ernest Reid has been asked to tighten up payment of emergency welfare payments following a story in the Hamilton Spectator showing an unemployed man "ripped off" the regional welfare office.

Administration committee made the request Wednesday in the wake of an Aug. 14 story which showed the man, who claimed to have bled welfare offices of \$2,500 in three weeks in six centres, applied for and was given assistance by Halton Region.

The Spectator reported that the man, in company with a reporter, presented a false letter from a prospective employer, waited half an hour and then received a cheque for \$44.25.

Mr. Reid speaking following the committee meeting said such cases are difficult to police, but said steps are being taken to ensure "we cover ourselves in situations like this."

"When a case like this occurs and we have evidence, we usually lay a charge," Mr. Reid said.

He could not confirm whether charges have been or will be laid against the man and the reporter.

The Spectator reported the uncashed cheque was returned to Halton Region.

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## Ontario's school bus safety regulations are everyone's responsibility.

# This is what you can do to make sure they're observed.

Your Ontario Government needs your help in protecting our province's school children. So we urge you as a motorist to drive with extra care whenever you see a school bus in front of you or coming towards you.

You will recognize the school bus by its chrome-yellow colour. And whenever it flashes its alternating red signal lights front and rear, you must stop. In fact, all traffic from both directions must stop.

This is true everywhere in Ontario... on highways, country roads, and city, town or village streets, and regardless of the speed limit. The penalty for disobeying this law is a fine of up to \$100 and 4 demerit points.

The only exception is for motorists going in the opposite direction from the school bus on the other side of a multi-lane highway divided by a physical barrier.

There is something else you can do, as well. Instruct your children to follow the school bus safety rules learned at school - to help the bus driver by behaving quietly and by keeping seated until it is time to leave the bus.
