Acton high school students working toward 31 awards

Students at Acton high school have 31 scholarships and awards varying from \$25 to \$200 for which they can apply. There are two \$200 awards, one from Indusmen Ltd. for grade 13 English and another from Beardmore and Company for Grade 13 chemistry. The Acton high school staff scholarship is for \$150 presented to a student who goes on in school and who has contributed to school life.

A \$125 bursary is available from Goy Cartage Co. to a student going on to a community college. The \$100 awards or scholarships are from the University Women's Club of Milton to a girl who goes to university—an all-round student who participates in school activities; the Royal Canadian Legion Scholarship for general proficiency to Grade 12 or 13 students going on to an institute of higher learning; the Clara Grindley Memorial Bursary to the Grade 13 student who has shown academic achievement, school citizenship and who plans to continue in school; the Province of Ontario for an 80 per cent average in six Grade 13 subjects and the Ontario Ministry of Education secondary school bursary geared for Grade 12 or 13 students in need.

The four awards for \$75 are from Acton Pharmacy for Grade 13 biology; the E.G. Tyler Award for the student who makes the greatest contribution to the school; the Outers Award to the student who has made a significant contribution to the Outers program and who has successfully completed Grade 13 and the Halton board of education achievement awards to the student from Grade 12 or 13 who continues in school.

Awards valued at \$50 are available from Beardmore and Company to a Grade 12 chemistry student; the Hurst Memorial Award to a Grade 13 history student; the Amos Mason Rotary Scholarship to the student entering a registered nursing course with the highest marks; Diston (Canada) Award to a Grade 13 geography student; Building Products of Canada Award to a Grade 13 physics student; Halton District Women's Institute Award to the Grade 12 or 13 student who continues with education; and the Lakeside Chapter of the I.O.D.E. to the Grade 12 graduate who has shown academic excellence, good school citizenship and is going on to higher learning.
