Curling unsafe?

It appears that hockey arenas are not the only ice-palaces that are feeling the wrath of the Ontario Labour Ministry's safety-oriented arena closures campaign.

Twenty-four curling clubs have been designated as unsafe in the province that have been designated unsafe for us.

Of the 24 clubs named, 17 are within the Ontario curling Association's jurisdiction, but the OCA doesn't appear to be overly worried about the condemnation.

Six of the 17 OCA associated clubs that have been ruled unsafe already have architects' drawings certified for repairs and OCA secretary-treasurer, Eric Wiffen has stated: "Our view is that the government is realistic about the problem."

The OCA has had an engineering committee for some time to advise on club construction and to deal with technical problems.

Wiffen noted that his association has tried to put the clubs concerned in contact with the ministry in order to speed up the process of making application for a grant and that they have attempted to help the clubs find people in their area who are qualified to make an inspection.

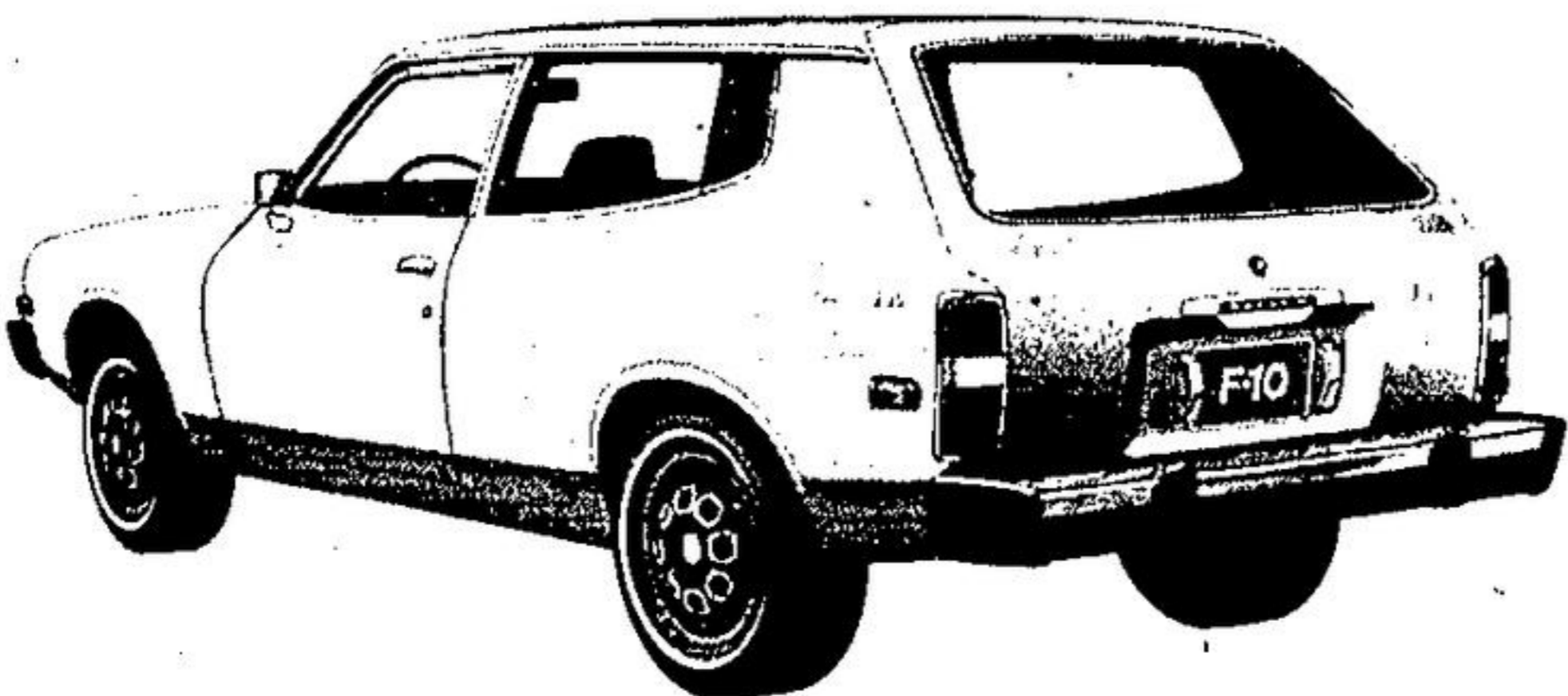
