and the examples of competition in the outside world.

He argued that the recent Olympic Gemes is one example of "where competition, standards, objectives and emotional responses are of great importance."

## Capital funds okay for sewer job

Halton Region will be asked to pay for the Acton Mill Street sewer repair from capital funds.

Council approved the recommendation last week despite the walking out of Coun. Ric Morrow momenta before adjourment in protest against the action.

The \$15,688.55 repair to the sewer line cause when blockages occured and soil and water filled the inspection excavation should be paid for from current funds.
