

Acton convenience store gets the nod

Before planning department they will study the whole block. Town planner Mario Venditti said, "We'll take a look at the whole block in terms of planning - residential, industrial and commercial - and debate what to designate the entire block."

Presently zoned industrial, the developers applied for rezoning to commercial to enable them to construct a store, on what Venditti called "essentially a residential building block."

"We need a more comprehensive review of the commercial development in downtown Acton," said assistant town planner Ron Burnett, "so the planning department will undertake a study of the neighbourhood."

He showed the committee a map of the area and pointed out the 35 by 74 lot where the proposed store will be situated. Mr. Venditti said the analysis report on the block should be completed in one month. The study will include whether the proposed store is close enough to the Kingham Hill residences to serve them conveniently.

"I hope one month will not be detrimental to the developer," said Coun. Les Duby, "something should be done to dress up the area a bit."

Block Parents need more support

Acton's Block Parent program "definitely needs more support," Lonnie Harkens says who chairs the program.

"I'd like to get 400 (applications) but I'd be happy with 150," she said last week. Thirty-five applications received during the summer are now being cleared by the police she said.
