ONTARIO OUTDOORS Hunting necessary conservation

REGULATED HUNTING IS A CONSERVATION MEASURE, and as such is important to wildlife. This fact is shown almost every day in the realm of "nature" and has been recognized for many centuries by native peoples of the world. Only recently has civilized man recognized that fact. Now we call it "wild life management" and it is scientifically regulated. To help you with planning this years hunt, there are several pamphlets available that you should know about and study.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS IN ONTARIO. describes areas managed by the Ministry of Natural Resources in co-operation with land owners and conservation authorities. Summary of the ONTARIO HUN-TING REGULATIONS; this pamphlet, shows the seasons and areas that you can and cannot hunt.

OUR POSITION ON GUN CONTROL, issued by the ONTARIO FEDERATION of ANGLERS and HUNTERS, includes a membership application. I have been expounding their virtues for years in person and in this column. I still feel that every person that hunts or fishes, or even just plain enjoys the outdoors should join fine organization. I have several of the above pamphlets on hand for those who wish them, but I would especially want to get the one on the Federation into your hands.

Over the last few months I have signed up some forty members and I have not stopped yet, and will not till I have signed up all sportsmen and sportswomen.

Down to hunting. A pamphlet on LUTHER MARSH WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA. This one shows the area by map and explains the details of the marsh. By the way, the season has been retarded to DAWN on opening day now instead of the aforementioned NOON opening. As to duck identification, DUCKS UNLIMITED has a BROCHURE out that shows the many ducks in full colour and tell of that great organization and the work they do to maintain breeding areas for ducks. They are saving and restoring marshes and swamps to provide habitat for ducks. GROUSE population could be better this year, according to the M.O.N.R. in the Temagami district, as well as many other areas of ONTARIO, the Ministry does a SIGHT census on the grouse population in any one given aren. This is done by the staff seeing grouse and reporting them as they drive along the roads within their jurisdic-

The number of miles driven and the grouse sighted are computed each year and the differences noted as a forcast of the hunting prospects.
