Halton Hills Arts Council formed

An interim executive for an Arts Council in Halton Hills was formed Thursday following an address by a member of a similar council in Etobicoke.

Barbara Sheffield of Arts Etobicoke told about 20 members of art-related groups in Halton Hills that the nine year history of her group, started in 1968 with a \$3,000 grant from the borough, has

now reached \$23,000 annually. The common problems of financing and storage space brought together five groups under the name Performing Arts Council in 1968. Three years later the group expanded to include other art-related groups and in 1973 changed its name to Arts Etobicoke. It has 40 member groups now, Sheffield said.

During a question period Miss Sheffield told Coun. Roy Booth that Arts Etobicoke applied annually to council for a grant which it then proportioned among its member groups in amounts varying from thousands of dollars to as little as \$200. Each group submitted a budget with its request and proper business procedures were followed, she said.

Getting an arts centre of their own was "an awful lot of work," she warned the group.

"It won't be easy," Arts Etobicoke has established a building fund but at present its member groups work out of a warehouse where the \$7,000 annual rent is paid out of the borough's grant.

Representatives from the Credit Valley Artisans, The Camera Club, Georgetown Choral Society, University Women's Club, Esqueping Historical Society, Pen and Palette Club, Murray Memorial YMCA, Georgetown Little Theatre, the library and the recreation and parks department attended the meeting.

Members of the interim executive are Keith Barber, Ralph Ursel, John Roe, Eleanor Langdon, Brenda McNeill, Margaret Dewdney, Glen Gray, Betsy Cornwell and Henry Cornfoot.

The next executive meeting is Oct. 12.

Craft show

The ladies of St. Margaret's Guild, St. Alban's Church, Grand Valley, are busy preparing for their second annual arts, crafts, and hobby show Saturday Oct. 2.

Held again in the Grand Valley and District school auditorium, the show will feature exhibits of work by talented local craftsmen.

'Waste dance' held at DRG to honor success of efforts

A Georgetown company that reduced by three per cent its production of waste will have a "waste dance" for its employees who make the program successful.

DRG Stationery Co., personnel manager John H. McDonald said that from May to July this year a chart at the punch clock showed on a daily basis the accumulated waste. The chart was the idea of a

waste committee of management and members of Local 1173, Canadian Paperworkers. Mr. McDonald said he believed it was a first for the area but not necessarily for Canada.

Waste paper comes from trimmed ends and bad runs, McDonald said. As much as \$500 of paper may be wasted just in setting up a run, he said. The paper is baled and sold to

a waste recycling company in Toronto.

"The waste reduction program is an ongoing thing," McDonald said last week. "The savings can be very very considerable."

At the dance, Oct. 16 at St. George's Anglican Church hall, the company will have three elimination draws with cash prizes. About 50 couples are expected to attend, he said.

Chess mess

Our "player of the week" this time is Tony Smith of Market Street. Tony has just completed Grade 9 at GDHS and, like several others, began playing in tournaments for the first time this year. His current CFC rating of 1423 makes him 3rd in Georgetown and 2nd among active tournament players. Despite his busy schedule, Tony graciously consented to give the following interview to our columnist.

CM: When did you learn to play?
 TS: When I was about 7.
 CM: Where would you rank yourself in relation to other Georgetown players?
 TS: What did everybody else say? I guess I'm in the top 5.
 CM: Could you share with us some advice for beginning players?
 TS: Me? Advice? It's stupid to play all the time; it's too boring. I haven't played since the last tournament but just a few days ago I picked up a book to rate my chess and I'm playing my best now.
 CM: What are your favorite openings?
 TS: King's Gambit and Sicilian.
 CM: What is your most memorable tournament?
 TS: Probably the Ontario Open.
 CM: Who is the world's best player?
 TS: Fischer. I don't even know who the other guy is.
 CM: Who are Georgetown's 3 best players?
 TS: Me? I won't answer that.
 CM: What board did you play on the GDHS team?
 TS: Put me down as 1st Junior. Don't put me down as 3rd. I can beat (Brad) Waters.
 CM: What kind of rating are you looking for?
 TS: Well, of course I want 2000.
 CM: What's your playing style?
 TS: Me? Is the Sicilian aggressive? Put me down as a positional player.
 CM: Do you have any comment on the "Ontario Place" incident?
 TS: Oh, that thing with Andre (Boisvenue)? I thought it was funny.

Tony is noted not only for his playing but also for his impetuous expression at the board. As Mory Hunter, White Oak's number 1 board once commented, "He looks sort of like a blank, that guy." The following game, from the 1976 Ontario Open, is a good example of Tony's chess.

White: Ivans Black: T. Smith Sicilian Defence
 1.e4 c5 2.Nf3 e6 3.d4 cd4 4.Nxd4 Nf6 5.Nc3 Bb4 (A dubious move as White could now get the edge by 6.e5! eg: 6...Qa5 7.Nbd5 Nd5 8.Bd2 or 7.Ne4 Qd4! This variation, which has been thoroughly analysed by Georgetown players, is unsound for Black, but only if White finds the right moves!) 6.Bd3? Nc6 7.Be3 a6 8.O-O Bxc3 9.bc3 d5 10.Nxc3 bc5 11.35 Nd7 12.(4 Qa5 13.c4 Rb8 14.cd5 d5 15.Qg4 g6 16.Qh4 h5 17.Rd2? (Removing the Rook from the d defense of the Q-side. 17.Rd4 was better.) 17...Rb2 18.Rg3 Rxa2 19.Rf1 Qd8 20.Qh3 Qe7 21.Bxg8? (White's game is difficult, but this finishes him.) 21...Jg8 22.Rxg8 Nf8 23.Rg5 Rxc2 24.Rb1 Rcd2 25.Rb6 a5 26.f5 Qa3! (White's initiative is over, and Black rapidly winds up the game with this counter-attack.) 27.Kg1 Qa1 ch 28.Kf2 Rcd2 ch 29.Kf3 Qf8 ch 30.White Resigns.
