The race was run over a winding, hilly, 2.62 mile course and inclement weather. hampered the drivers even

The race was organized by the Canadian Automobile Car Clubs association and driers from five regions, British Columbia, the Prairies, Ontario, Quebec and the Atlantic region competed.

The year's top finishers in each region were invited to compete and all regions and classes were well represented. Three classes raced in the event.

This is Neil's first year of racing, but he has done conrallying driving. Neil qualified for the post position in the race on Saturday, in his class, with a time of 2:09.36. He was a full row ahead of the next car in his class, an Alfa Romeo Gullietta Sprint, driven by Richard Barwell of Van-

Sunday, race day, broke cold and clear and the morning was spent warming up, acrubbing in new tires and making some last minute adjustments to the cur engine and chassis.

The race got under way about 2:30 p.m. Sunday, with 35 cars and drivers ready to challenge the course. Neil's strategy was to allow a more experienced driver to lead him in the first part of the race and stay close enough to take advantage of an opportunity to pass, should the situation arise, in the latter part of the race. As it happened, the plan worked to perfection.
