This is the second such benefit in GLT's history with last years honoured recipient being the Georgetown and District memorial hospital, in the amount of \$600.

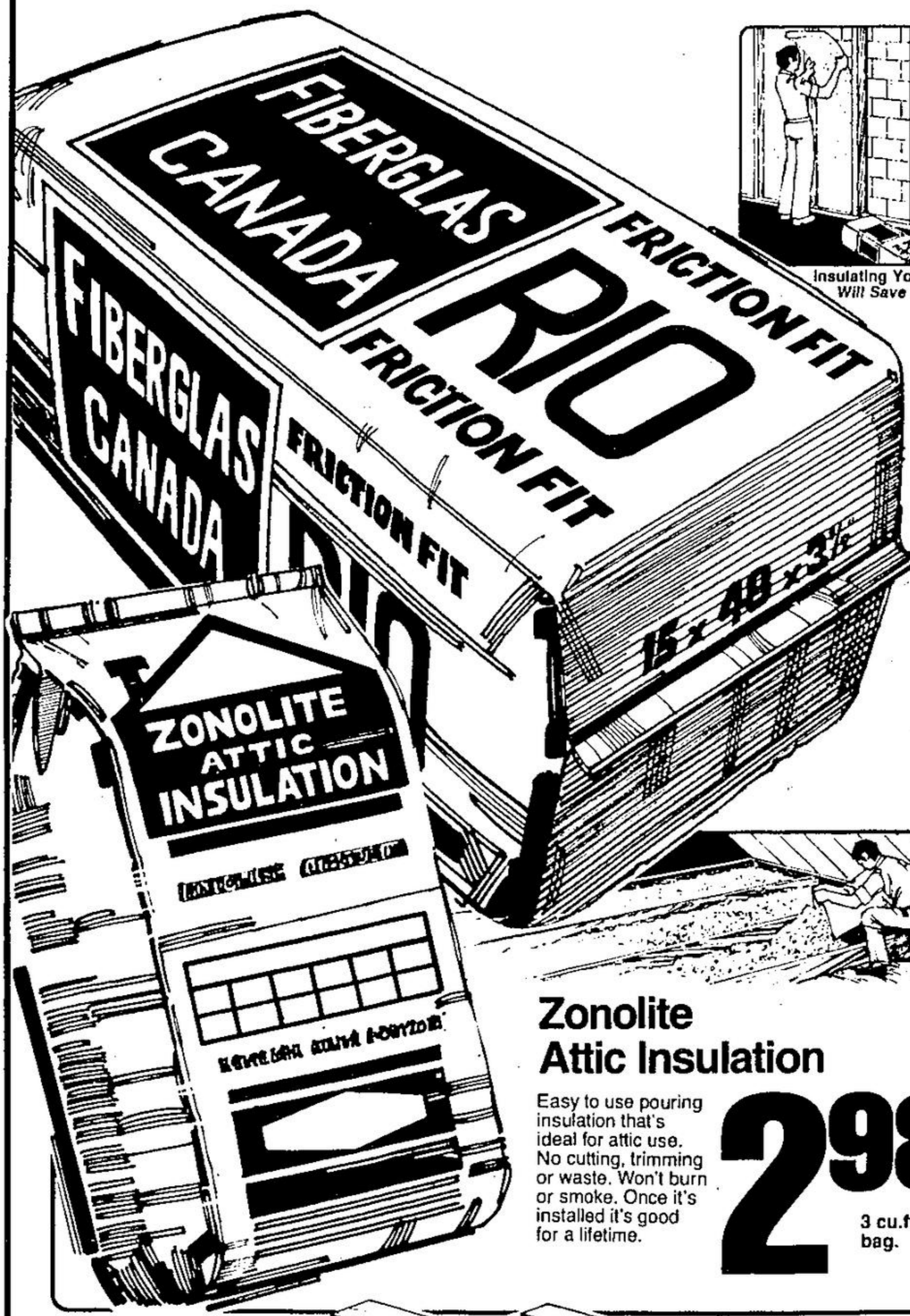
Proceeds from the evening performance and the wine and cheese party will go to the Adult Rehabilitation Centre through the association.

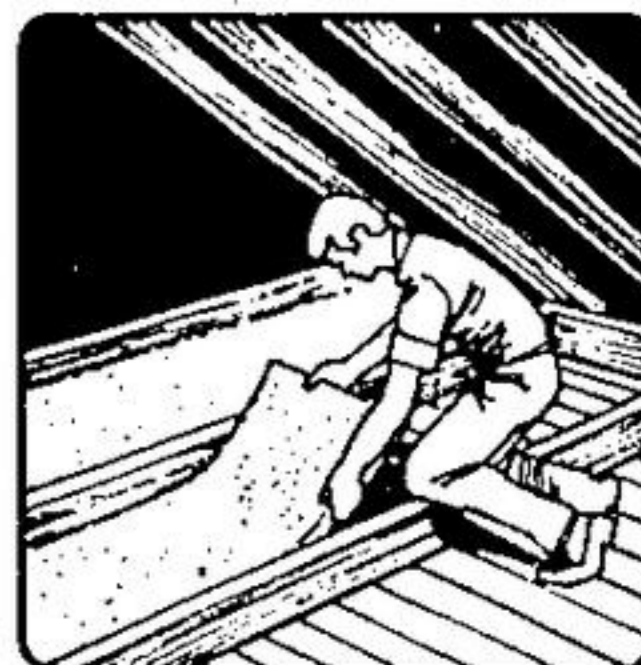

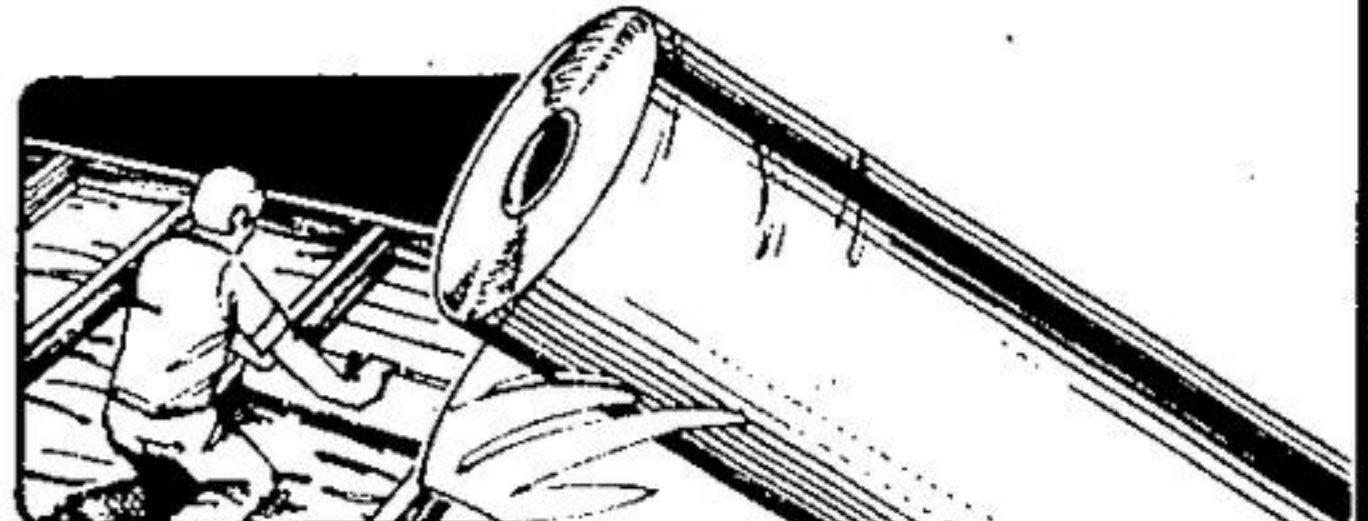
