From a man's view

Joseph Hagge of Georgetown braved a crowd of 600 women at Sheridan College's Insight conference focusing on choices for women Saturday.

Though men were welcome, Mr. Hagge believes only three attended because, "many men feel threatened by the women's movement... it's sad to see more men didn't show up."

Mr. Hagge and his wife Pat Stuart-Hagge took their son Damian to the day-long adventure of guest speakers, films and seminars.

They particularly enjoyed a documentary movie on sex stereotyping which advocated their philosophy of child-rearing.

It depicted an experimental primary school in California which treats students as equals and ignores traditional roles. Non-sexist textbooks are used and both little boys and girls learn how to sew and use a saw.

Being teachers, they believe the educational system, and parents, should make a combined effort to promote equality to unshackle future generations from the inhibiting roles still prevalent today.

"We need a male liberation too," said Mr. Hagge, who is supportive of women who develop themselves as individuals instead of conforming to stereotypes.

"Roles are not good for anyone—men or women," he added, "Men should try to be themselves more, and not be frightened of expressing their emotions... so many men live behind a facade: The big, strong, masculine image."

"The status quo of men's still well protected," he said. "They can compensate for their own inadequacies by overpowering a woman. But when there's real sexual equality, some men will find out they are not what they think they are."

Many men with the responsibility of employing are "hypocrites," observed Mr. Hagge.

"A study done in Toronto concluded that the majority of educated men in managerial positions say they are all for equality and opportunity for women in business, but in practice, it's a different story."

Not fully blaming men for the subservient position of women and discrimination against them in the work force, Mr. Hagge added: "Women are their own worst enemies... especially older women who are set in their ways."

For example, a woman who has worked her way up into a top secretarial position resents a young woman being hired as her boss."

Joe Hagge and Pat Stuart-Hagge believe in human liberation, "through a co-operative effort by both sexes."
