Royalettes win league, cap fabulous 1976 summer campaign

The Georgetown Legion Royalettes claimed the Peel County Juvenile Girls Softball League championship last TUESDAY (September 28) by defeating Alderwood, 10-7, in a game that was as close, if not closer, than the score would indicate.

The Royalettes had defeated Alderwood 3-2 in the first game of the best of three series and the league title win, capped the finest season that the Legion sponsored team has ever had. Ted Wilkes, Coach of the Royalettes, has tutored a majority of the 1976 edition of the Royalettes, from Bantam age. This year was to be the year of the big push, and in a definite understatement, it most certainly was.

The Royalettes year record, in tournament and exhibition play stands at 40 wins, four losses and a tie. Two of the losses came in tournament play, —ironically one was against Aimsbury, the team the Royalettes defeated for the Provincial title—and two came en route to the Provincial Juvenile Girls "A" crown. The lone tie occurred in league play, against Burlington in the last game of the regular league season. In games that the Royalettes played, they outscored their opponents, on the average, 10-4, and their combined team batting average was a sparkling .551.

The second championship series game—and as it turned

out, the deciding one—seemed to be completely controlled by the Georgetown diamond stars in the early going. The Royalettes led, 8-1, after four innings and looked well on their way to coasting to the title.

Things changed drastically in the later innings, however, as Alderwood counted two runs in the fifth and sixth innings, to two Royalette runs in the sixth, to make the game interesting. At that point, the Georgetowners led, 10-5, but Alderwood was not about to give up the quest. They scored two runs in their half of the seventh, to close the gap to 10-7, before the Royalettes tightened up and put a damper on Alderwood's bleak, but improving hopes.

Laura Wilkes picked up the win, she needed relief help from Barb Curry in the sixth inning. Defensively, Leanne Gilson and Charlene Milton, both had strong games.

It has been a fabulous year for the Royalettes. They are their league champions, Provincial "A" champs as well as champions of the Sarnia and their own hosted tournament.

The Royalettes were coached by Ted Wilkes, with Mike Harley acting as Assistant Coach and Managed by Ruby Wilkes. Team members include, Margot

Season opens this Friday

Raiders lose to Mississauga, prove they are competitive

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders hosted the Senior "A" Mississauga Golden Arrows last Friday night in an exhibition game at the Gordon Alcott Memorial arena and while the visitors skated off to a narrow, 6-5 win, the Raiders gained a moral victory in the knowledge that they are competitive against Senior "A" opponents.

Granted, Mississauga has a long way to go before they can rightfully claim to be of top Senior "A" calibre but the Raiders more than held their own and in fact, dominated play in the first period, and part of the third.

A sparse crowd of approximately 200 patrons took in the game and they voiced their approval when Doug Tate on passes from Tom Daley and Art Webster, put the Raiders on the scoreboard first at the 10:38 mark of the opening

period. Bob Fotheringham (who played last year for the Georgetown Geminis) scored his first, of two for the night, at the 14:01 point to open up the Raider lead to 2-0. The second goal quite possibly wakened up the Golden Arrows as they narrowed the Raider lead to 2-1 just three minutes later, to round out the first period scoring.

Mississauga held a 4-3 lead after two periods, as a result of two power play goals and an even-man situation score, while the second period Raider tally was counted by Bob Elnesky, who lotted last year for the Norval Allouettes of the Georgetown Industrial Hockey League.

The third period provided the best action in the game and advantages sea-sawed until the 16:24 mark, when Mississauga scored what proved to be the winning goal.

In the earlier going, Mississauga jumped out to a 5-3 lead with a goal barely a minute and a half into the final frame. Ray Evans brought the "RED and White" crew to within striking distance with an unassisted effort at the 4:11 mark and Bob Fotheringham tied the game for the local favourites with a marker at the 12:33 mark.

Had the Georgetown crew managed to put another goal at this point, they just might have coasted to a win. Mississauga were not in control of their game, but the luck of the draw went to the visitors as they took the wind out of the Raider's sails with their late final goal.

Raider goal scorers included Fotheringham, with two, while singles went to Doug Tate, Bob Elnesky, and Ray Evans. Elnesky and Tate also added assists to their point
